Opening Reflection by David Greatorex Synod Treasurer

Making the Changes

In preparation for worship last Sunday, I noted some points in the section for the address to the younger members of the congregation. The object of the game was to memorise a number of items (on screen in our case) and then remove one - with the aim of someone being able to identify which one was missing. This was repeated several times. The whole congregation took part, most having either played it years ago, or even recently. It engendered some fun!

Remember the game? It was played on a table or tray when I was younger. It is called "Kim's Game" and named after a **Rudyard Kipling** character from his book **Kim**.

So, what was the point of this? And even more so, what was the reason for playing it as part of worship?

Kipling's Kim was learning to become a spy and this was part of the training. To notice things, and changes.

Sometimes we notice change. Sometimes we don't. Sometimes it's for the better. Sometimes it's for the worse. Sometimes the changes are quite small. Sometimes they can be really big. Sometimes even catastrophic.

Back when God was sharing his blueprint for a new society, Israel was given the rules needed to make sure everyone was equal and looked after. But God knew that things would change over time. Some people would gain great wealth whilst others would gain great debt. Some people would lose their land while others would even lose their freedom. [Wow! That sounds very familiar in our present circumstances.]

So, God gave his people the chance to reset – to look back at how things were at the beginning and go back to that fairer world. Once in a generation – every 50 years – God told the people to forgive debts, return land, free slaves, and let the land rest, so all people and even the Earth could get back to how things were meant to be. It was called the **Year of Jubilee**. I wonder... how we might influence and change the way we live today to make the world a fairer place?

In this Jubilee year for the URC, is that just what is being done?

General Assembly agreed to make 'Cost of Living' payments to assist Ministers and staff with rising household costs, and to investigate a 'benevolent fund to help retired ministers'. A new initiative is underway with the aim of creating a national support fund.

In our own Synod, the recent Meeting agreed to set aside a sum to support churches in difficulties with energy payments. This is supported by the East Midlands Trust and details are being developed. The Trust directors have recognised the effect of costs on our own staff and provided appropriate support.

So, what about the Resource Areas, groups of churches and individual churches - what can be done here? I'm sure some will manage OK, but not so sure about a number of others. Probably we are not able to do what was described in **Leviticus** as God's Jubilee plan, but maybe, just maybe, there is an opportunity to help in a loving and neighbourly way in these inflationary times. Perhaps just talking might be of help, but hopefully more likely some local conversations could lead to positive and creative ways to do supportive things together.

If intuitive and positive solutions are found, how about <u>sharing with us</u>, so we can then share across the Synod?



Lay Presidency at the Sacraments

You are reminded that this year's **Sacraments Support Day** takes place at **Christ Church URC**, Leicester on **Saturday 26 November**, led by East Midlands Synod Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** and Synod Clerk the **Revd Camilla Veitch**. This should be attended by all Authorised Elders due to refresh their training to preside at Baptisms and Holy Communion. "Refresher" training takes place from 1.30-4.00pm; anyone newly nominated to preside should attend from 10.30am.

All churches have been contacted earlier this year to ask whether they wished anyone currently serving as Authorised Elders to continue in that role, or to make any fresh nominations. Authorised Elders last trained before 2018 who are unable to attend the Sacraments Support Day for any reason are invited to contact **Derek Graham** (Training & Development Officer) for advice: please email training@urc5.org.uk.

Authorisation to preside at the Sacraments is granted by the Synod, rather than the local church; its extension is now conditional on undertaking refresher training every five years, instead of three years as before. Lay Preachers who are invited to preside at Holy Communion from time to time are asked to maintain their training in the same way. Wessex Synod informs us of the death of retired minister the Revd Chris Copley. Chris died on Tuesday 18 October 2022. She served at: City Temple (1983-86); Bushey (1986-90); Bannister Street, Lytham (1996-98); and Lymington (2011-17). We hold Chris's family and friends in our prayers.

Here are a few more of the individual squares found in the banner, all from churches who chose to represent their local presence and ministry by reflecting God's green fingers.





Spalding URC have created a stylised representation of the tulip fields that play such a major part in the life of the Lincolnshire town. For more than 50 years, the church welcomed and fed hundreds of visitors on the weekend of the annual Tulip Parade and many became friends, returning year after year.



Rose Hill URC in Chesterfield also chose a floral theme, in keeping with the church's name: a beautiful yellow rose. It was embroidered by church member **Margaret Meeney**.



Arnold URC is represented by a flower inspired by those found alongside the church's driveway. Craft Club member **Hazel Bromiley** used acrylics to paint her own design, in which the bloom represents Jesus, Light of the World, while the brown stem and green leaves symbolise the Cross.

Mackworth URC have chosen to depict their magnificent flowering cherry, planted when the church was built over 60 years ago. Secretary **Ann Luckett** explains,

"Every child who has gone through the church, Boys' Brigade or Girls' Brigade has played under it, picnicked by it or tried to climb it." Making a wonderful display of blossom every spring, it stands as a potent symbol of the church.





Church gardens also feature in the panel crafted by members of the **Hobby** and Chat group at Long Eaton URC. Standing right in the centre of the town, the church was built in 1876 as the Congregational Church and is proud to have praised God and served its community for almost 150 years. Secretary Teresa Hopkins says, "We have a beautiful lawned area at the front of church, surrounded by flowering shrubs and trees, which has seen many Sunday picnics, garden parties and recently an outdoor baptism!" The musical notes, meanwhile, mark the community choir concerts and robust hymn singing which give rise to its local nickname as the "singing church".

The contribution from **Newport Pagnell URC** symbolises its vision of a new building as a community hub serving the needs of local people. This vision has now been realised in bricks and mortar in the form of the **Mead Centre**, a place where it hopes seeds will fall on good soil and bring forth grain a hundredfold. The patchwork panel, crafted by **Lyn Kidby** using homemarbled fabric appliqued to the backing material, represents the seed of the church's vision gradually blooming towards its destiny.

Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is an internationally recognised training course, designed to teach people how to spot the signs and symptoms of mental ill health and provide help on a first aid basis. MHFA England offer a range of courses tailored for people who teach, work, live with and care for young people aged 8 to 18. The courses can be attended by anyone from age 16 upwards. Each and every MHFA England course is delivered by a quality assured instructor.

Youth MHFA Two Day course

Completing the two-day course qualifies you as a Youth Mental Health First Aider, equipped with:

- An in-depth understanding of young people's mental health and factors that affect wellbeing
- Practical skills to spot the triggers and signs of mental health issues
- Confidence to reassure and support a young person in distress
- Enhanced interpersonal skills such as non-judgemental listening
- Knowledge to help a young person recover their health by guiding them to further support whether that's through self-help sites, their place of learning, the NHS, or a mix engaging with parents, carers and external agencies where appropriate
- Ability to support a young person with a long-term mental health issue or disability to thrive
- Tools to look after your own mental wellbeing.



Tuesday 22-Saturday 26 November Online


For five days beginning on **Tuesday 22 November**, **URC Spirituality** invites you to prepare for Advent by dropping into its free online sessions.
