# Opening Reflection by the Revd Geoffrey Clake East Midlands Synod Moderator

### **Voting Matters!**

New voting regulations for voting in General Elections and Local Government elections are among the issues highlighted by the denominational **Church & Society Team** in their Spring Synod Meetings mailing\*. They encourage us to note the changes and to help ensure wider awareness:

The rules around voting in general elections in Britain and for local elections in England and Wales are changing. In addition to being registered on the electoral roll, from 4 May 2023 you must also produce an approved form of identity card at the polling station to be able to vote.

This challenge set me thinking...

**Voting is both duty and privilege – and is about 'us' not me'.** I can still recall the sense of excitement I felt the first time I entered a polling booth and used the pencil-on-a-string to place my 'X' against the candidate of my choice. Over the years it hasn't always been easy to hold on to that feeling. We can conclude that our vote makes no difference; that all candidates or options fall short of what we hold as principles and ideals. We do well to remember that we cannot lament the outcome of any election if we have not voted. We have a duty as citizens living in a democracy. The privilege of having a vote is one which many of our forebears did not have – nor is it universally enjoyed across every part of the world.

And as followers of Jesus, the voting booth is one of the places in which we bring our perspective that we ought to be willing to support what benefits those most needing it even if it doesn't advantage us personally. **John Wesley**, writing in 1774, offered this counsel:

- 1. To vote, without fee or reward, for the person they judged most worthy
- 2. To speak no evil of the person they voted against, and
- 3. To take care their spirits were not sharpened against those that voted on the other side.

**Every voter matters** and **our identity is in Christ.** Church & Society's challenge highlights the fact that the introduction of a requirement for ID may disenfranchise some. **St Paul**'s imagery of all parts of the body being equal and necessary (1 Corinthians 12:12-31) serves to challenge us to ensure maximal inclusion. The new government legislation may be a tougher requirement for some of us than others. Church & Society urges us to do what we can in helping others in meeting this requirement.

We might also like to cling to the affirmation that as individuals, whatever our ID documents may look like, our true identity is as those beloved of God. With God – and in the exercise of our discipleship – we need no ID documents. God knows everything about us; each of us matters to God, regardless of our bank balance, CV or achievements. (Take a moment to reflect on **Psalm 139** on this.)

And when it comes to our own church governance, we believe that **voting in the councils of the church is for the purpose of discerning the mind of Christ** and not about winning or losing the support needed for a resolution. In every council of the church – in Church Meeting, Elders' Meeting, Synod Meeting or General Assembly – we embody our belief that we are a theocracy rather than democracy. Our councils are for discerning together – even against our own preferences – how to move together faithfully under God; they are not places for us to lobby or seek to get our own way. Consensus voting is



but one tool for checking out that all voices and views are heard and subjected to discernment. Some of the most wonderful meetings I have been in have been those in which my views and predictions of where we might be heading are turned upside down by hearing the voices of others.

So, as well as doing what we can to ensure as many people as possible have the ID they need to vote, let us play our part in valuing our own councils and the call to discern the mind of Christ within them.

Across Great Britain, 30% of URC congregations have already registered with <u>Eco Church</u> (or Eco-Congregation in Scotland). Fifty churches have reached Silver and four have received their Gold award. Synods too are working towards Eco Synod status.
