
Opening Reflection by the Revd Jane Wade Deputy Moderator of the East Midlands Synod

As non-conformists, most of us don't usually, as congregations, share Communion weekly. With notable exceptions, the majority of our **United Reformed Churches** choose to share Communion as part of the morning service once a month. There are of course occasions that transcend this 'rule', including for many, the midnight Communion of **Christmas Eve** and remembering the Lord's Supper on **Maundy Thursday**.

For me the words of our simple Communion service become even more poignant (if that's possible) on these two occasions. Sharing communion on the night of our dear Lord's birth, we remember how he came to live our common life, to show us the Father's love and compassion for us, and ultimately to go to the cross to take upon himself the sins of the world.

And sharing Communion on **Maundy Thursday**, we remember the last evening Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room before his arrest and crucifixion. Remembering Jesus' humility as he washes the disciples' feet so they could comfortably dine together.

Remembering the institution of the Lord's Supper: how Jesus took the ordinary food of everyday life - bread and wine - and gave them new symbolic meaning, that becomes a reminder for his disciples and the generations of his disciples to come...



As they were eating Jesus held their attention. He took bread in his hands, offered a prayer of thanks to God, broke the bread, and said "This bread is broken - as my body is broken."

He offered it to them and invited them to eat ... "Remember," he said, "all that I have done for you." Then a little later, when their meal was complete, he took a cup of wine, lifted it high and offered a prayer of thanks to God, and said, "This wine is a sign of my blood, poured out in the world. The wrongs done to me will spill my blood. And this wine is for you a sign of my love and forgiveness for the world."

Then he offered it to them and invited them to drink. "Give thanks," he said, "for all I have done." Here in bread and wine God speaks to us of Christ's life laid down and love declared. Each time we share bread and wine in this way, this is what we remember.

And remembering his new commandment to 'love one another'. Actually, the name 'Maundy Thursday' comes from the Latin *mandatum novum*, referring to the 'new commandment' Jesus taught his disciples.

"A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another." John 13:34-35 Jesus' actions and words of the Last Supper remind us of the sacrifice he made for us, the beautiful exchange that is made on the cross as Jesus dies, so that we may become the righteousness of God – *"For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God"* (2 Corinthians 5:21).

How he set an example of what it means to imitate him with our lives; and how we are called to be the servant of others, to live with humility, and love in every situation.

"So let us learn how to serve And in our lives enthrone Him. Each other's needs to prefer For it is Christ we're serving."

"This is our God the Servant King He calls us now to follow Him. To bring our lives as a daily offering Of worship to the Servant King."

Church gives quake appeal a £1K boost

Melbourne URC was recently featured in a local paper, <u>Village Voice</u>, sharing news of their latest fundraising initiative. We are very happy to share some of the article with you:

Congregation members from one of Melbourne's churches, along with visitors from far and wide, have helped raise more than £1,000 for victims of terrible earthquakes this year.

Leaders at the United Reformed Church decided they must try to help those affected by devastating earthquakes in Turkey and Syria in February. In a few weeks the church has raised £1,100 for the Disasters Emergency Committee's **Turkey-Syria Earthquake Appeal**.

Funds have been raised from a coffee morning, a lent lunch, donations, and the second-hand book and jigsaw sale that takes place in the church hall every Thursday.

Margaret Loydall, who has been secretary of the United Reformed Church for the past 61 years, said that fellow congregation members had been so appalled by scenes of devastation from Turkey and Syria that a fund-raising appeal was quickly organised. "The pictures we have seen on the television, it was really almost unbelievable to think that people are going through that," she said. "You couldn't find words to describe it really, and we decided we wanted to do something about it- and that's what we did. We arranged it very quickly, and gave it out on our church notices, and our church responded in a big way."

Training to be an Assembly Accredited Lay Preacher

Encouragement and inspiration

Could you become an Assembly Accredited Lay Preacher?

The two-year **Assembly Accredited Lay Preachers course** is currently offered through Northern College in Manchester, one of the URC's Resource Centres for Learning. First and second-year AALP students recently met together on the weekend of 18-19 March to explore themes like Finding God in Difficult Times, the Spirituality of Older People, Technology in Worship, and Worship Choices in Challenging Times.



Five of the current AALP students hail from the East Midlands Synod. One of them, **Mark Renshaw** of Sutton-in-Ashfield URC, offers this recommendation:

The privilege to preach is one I am always humbled by, and having nearly completed my first year of training at Northern College, one I would call others to try. Preaching in our pulpits needs people with varying experience and across ages and identities. The Word is to all who hear and should not be limited to only old white men like myself to give.

Northern College has some very good lecturers who can offer knowledge and insight in plain English. They are supportive and encouraging, offering advice and knowledge for the times you are taken by surprise, the times it seems difficult, and ways of interpreting our traditions for the modern Church. They equip for all occasions and situations.

You will have five weekends at Manchester over the two years and the rest on Zoom about every five weeks. You will be able to put what you learn in to practice in front of the regular Church family, who always want to be supportive. So I appeal to young and old, however you identify yourself, to look at giving us your experience and allow the Lord to give you the words to preach.
