Opening Reflection by the Revd Andrew Mudharara East Midlands Synod Joint Racial Justice Advocate

Thirty Years On – Commemorating Stephen Lawrence



There have been a lot of significant changes that have taken place after the racially motivated murder of **Stephen Lawrence** in South-east London on 22 April 1993. But the reality on the ground is that we are still very far from the place that people from the Black and ethnic minoritised groups – and their white comrades who stand alongside them in the battle for justice and equality for all – would dream of in our society. Equality in law may be there on paper, but we are still continuing to dream of equal opportunities for some Black and ethnic minoritised communities in workplaces and communities.

The challenge for change to be rooted in our communities is that there are a lot of people who think and advocate that racism is not a problem in our civilised communities. The current findings still point to racism as a big challenge to the Metropolitan police and the recent findings also in the Fire Service across the country causes me to question if we have learnt anything as a country from the murder of Stephen Lawrence thirty years ago?

The question probably that is hardest to reflect on is whether the church has learnt anything from this and the many other racially motivated crimes committed against the ethnically minoritised in this country?

I wish the answer was that we have dealt with racism in the **United Reformed Church** well and will not allow racism to tear us apart from the love of God. The stories I hear and witness in the URC seem to suggest that we are a long way from the dream of a non-racist church. I should however admit that changes

are taking place and conversations are happening – but a lot needs to change if we have learnt anything from the racist murder of Stephen Lawrence.

I hope my daughter and the generations to come will not have to fight the beast of racism as we dream to move to a non-racist church by the time we are commemorating 35 years since the murder of Stephen Lawrence. I hope voices that are oppressed are being heard and action being taken to kick out racism in the Church and community.

We each as individuals have the job to listen and challenge this beast called racism when we see or suspect it – in the Church especially.

Pursuing Racial Justice

The role of **Racial Justice Advocate** in the East Midlands Synod is shared by the **Revd Andrew Mudharara** and the **Revd Samuel Silungwe**.

Andrew recently appeared in the powerful short film "Telling It Like It Is", commissioned by the Legacies of

Slavery Task Group. The film takes an uncomfortable look at the very real barriers encountered in the United Reformed Church by many of its Black members. Holding Jesus as a beacon of justice before us, urges us all to listen and to act together to turn the URC into an actively anti-racist church.


Stephen Lawrence Legacy Conversations: a Video Resource

Worthy Lundie Award Winner at Castle Hill URC

We send our congratulations to **Tommy Smith** of **Castle Hill URC** in Northampton, March's recipient of the <u>Lundie Memorial Award</u> for children and young people who are playing their part in the mission of God in their church, community or the wider world.



Twelve-year-old Tommy was nominated by Castle Hill's minister the **Revd Liz Adams** for his participation in its community outreach programme. Liz says, "a selfless, thoughtful act of kindness from a child who has hardships of his own melted my heart and I felt compelled to nominate him for this award."

At Christmas, the church provided small gifts for children and food, allowing families to have all that's needed for a traditional dinner. In the past, the church has donated scarves, hats and pyjamas.

This year Tommy suggested, due to the energy crisis, that blankets would be useful to keep the children

warm and reduce the need for the heating to be turned on. This was deemed an excellent suggestion and so the church applied for a grant and managed to purchase 210 blankets.

Tommy took it upon himself, with his mum's help, to wrap all 210 blankets. When asked why he offered to wrap them all, he said:

> "I wrapped the blankets so that all the children had something to open on Christmas Day that would then keep them warm. I felt happy when wrapping them as I was thinking about who they would be going to and if they would like them. I was very tired at the end."

Tommy said he felt proud to receive the award as he'd only offered to get involved to help children who may not have anything else. He plans to meet with Liz to discuss how to use the £100 award.

The Thames North Synod brings us news of the death of the **Revd Jean Wilkinson** on Monday 10 April. She had been a minister for over 65 years. Jean's Ordination took place on 1 July 1957 from Memorial College, Brecon where she was the first woman student. Her first ministry after that was at Mountain Ash in Wales. She 'retired' in 1993 and after retirement was for over 20 years a member of a united church of Methodist and URC in Brightlingsea, Essex. She moved to Gerrards Cross in 2015. URC Jubilee Celebration



This past Saturday (15 April) saw the joyous occasion of the <u>Service of Thanksgiving and Celebration</u> marking the United Reformed Church's **50th Anniversary**, in the magnificent surroundings of London's Westminster Central Hall where the denomination's founding service itself took place in 1972.

Initially scheduled for our Jubilee year of 2022, the service was postponed from its original date owing to rail strikes but nothing could have prevented the eventual celebration. It was preceded by an **Open Church House** event at which Training & Development Officer **Derek Graham** helped represent Education & Learning, and an organised <u>Walk to Westminster</u> between the two venues.



At the opening of the service, Synod Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** placed a candle to represent the East Midlands on a map of all 13 Synods. Worshippers from churches in Derby, Leicester, Lincoln, Newport Pagnell, Northampton, Nottingham, Wellingborough and others ensured that the East Midlands Synod was equally well represented in the flesh. The **Revd Peter Stevenson** of ChristChurch Grantham/Stamford URC and **Ruth and David Maddison** of Bulwell URC were amongst the volunteers welcoming attenders as they arrived at the main door. Meanwhile, numerous others from our Synod were able to take part online via the <u>live stream</u>.

The service featured a wealth of music from different eras and cultures,
