# Opening Reflection by Ben Twelves Synod Safeguarding Officer

Since 2006, I have always been sure of who I was. Whenever anyone asked me what I did, I could confidently, happily, and sometimes proudly declare, "I am a teacher." Everyone knew what that meant, so the safe, socially acceptable conversation could carry on without any awkwardness.



However, a few weeks ago, I was asked the usual question, "So what do you do?" and a realisation dawned in me that I wasn't sure what I was! I had just started my new job as Synod Safeguarding Officer and the thought of explaining what a synod was seemed very complicated. A garbled explanation of the conciliar structure of the URC fell out of my mouth and the other person must have been left with a mixture of confusion and a strong desire to go and speak to someone else.

Even if I had managed to convey the meaning of synod, the word safeguarding is not well understood either.

In our churches we have a habit of using fancy words. Often, they are useful, because they help us name huge concepts beyond our own understanding so that we can discuss them, although they can cause barriers to those that don't understand the words and make people feel left out. One of these fancy church words is *salvation* which we use to describe the process of being saved from sin and its consequences. However, *salvation* has the same origins as the word *safeguarding* and they both carry the meaning of "Keeping Safe". Salvation just has a bit



of ecclesiastical Latin thrown in to make it sound churchier! It seems strange that we use the two words in such different contexts, but I suspect that it might be seen as a bit over the top if I asked to change my job title to Synod Salvation Officer.

Jesus was obviously interested in Salvation, but he was also really into Safeguarding. One of Jesus' most dramatic statements occurs in Matthew 18:6, when he says:

*"If anyone causes one of these little ones - those who believe in me - to stumble, it would be better for them to have a large millstone hung around their neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea."* 

It's a horrible picture, but it tells us how passionate Jesus was about safeguarding, as well as salvation. Safeguarding is not just a legal duty or a vital part of being a good citizen, but it is our Mission. As followers of Jesus, we are called to safeguard the most vulnerable members of society. Safeguarding is often dismissed as needless bureaucracy, or a waste of time, but when it is done properly, it is showing the love of God to the world and being the hands of Jesus to those in need.

It wasn't a new message that Jesus brought. In Psalm 82 v 3-4, the writer calls us to: "Defend the weak and the fatherless; uphold the cause of the poor and the oppressed. Rescue the weak and the needy; deliver them from the hand of the wicked."

In Proverbs 31v8, a king was taught by his mother to: "Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves"

Yet now, in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, we are fortunate to live in a time where such power does not just lie with kings. We too, are called to speak up for those whose voices cannot be heard.

So, what do I do? I am here to help you on your mission. I'm here to ensure that you have the resources that you need to keep children and vulnerable adults in your church safe. ## **Statement on Nottingham Attacks**

In response to the distressing attacks in Nottingham in the early hours of Tuesday 13 June, East Midlands church leaders including our Synod Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** issued a statement of support.

Published jointly by the Anglican, Roman Catholic, Baptist, Methodist and United Reformed Churches in the East Midlands, the statement reads:



The thoughts and prayers of the Christian Community are with the families and loved ones of those killed and those injured in this morning's tragic events in Nottingham City Centre. We express our thanks to all the emergency services involved in responding to this incident.

In the face of such horror in the heart of Nottingham, our response must be one of a greater commitment to continue working together to build peace, solidarity and hope on our streets and in our City. We continue to work together with other faith leaders across the city as we support one another during this difficult time.

During this time, churches are open for anyone at all who might wish to seek some quiet space to reflect and process this morning's terrible news.

**St Andrew's with Castle Gate URC**, situated in Nottingham city centre, has dedicated its "Prayer for the Week" to all those affected:



A **Nottingham Together vigil** is to be held today (**Thursday 15 June**) at 5.30pm in the city's Old Market Square, to show solidarity with those who are grieving and take a stand against violence and division. The Lord Mayor **Clir Carole McCulloch**, Leader of the Council **Clir David Mellen** and University of Nottingham Vice Chancellor **Shearer West** are to be joined by representatives of Nottingham's faith communities in leading a minute's silence at 6.00pm from the steps of the Council House. People are invited to join from home by lighting a candle in their window or doorstep.


