Opening Reflection by Tom Donoghue

My preaching mentor, Christine, sadly died in December last year after a long battle with cancer. She was someone who was instrumental in shaping my faith and discipling me. One of the things I remember her teaching me, as we approached Christmas, was to appreciate the advent season rather than rushing into the Christmas story and one of the ways in which she encouraged me to do this was to


include Advent hymns in the Advent Sunday services as well as one or two Christmas carols!

My favourite Advent Hymn can actually be sung all year round: <u>Tell Out, My Soul,</u> the Greatness of the Lord. It was written by Timothy Dudley-Smith, after he read a modern paraphrase of the **Magnificat** in Luke 1:46-55 (New English Bible), which began with the same opening words which he used and provided the inspiration to write his hymn.

The tune certainly helps this to be a well sung hymn, which reflects for me the passion in which Mary spontaneously sings her song of praise to God. It is said that Mary's Magnificat is inspired by Hannah's song in 1 Samuel 2:2-10 and I love the way the song has been passed on and told through the generations - as the hymn concludes: "Tell out, my soul, the greatness of the Lord to children's children and for evermore!"

The similarities of the message are found in the praising of a mighty God, who acts, liberates and brings salvation to all of society and particularly lifts up the humble by making possible the extraordinary in the ordinary.

Ordinary Advent resource with my family and enjoying the challenge to be intentional about noticing God in our ordinary lives. As we use this advent time to reflect on the extraordinary Christmas message and what this means for us, my hope is that we as a family are able to help others to notice God in their ordinary lives too.



The words of the hymn tell of a faithful God whose love endures. Our God, who was born into creation through an ordinary couple, who were willing to say 'yes' to God's amazing plan for their lives.

In this period of waiting during Advent, let us wait expectantly, full of hope and in anticipation to see God at work in our ordinary lives. I encourage us to share with our family, friends, colleagues about the extraordinary ways we have seen God in our own ordinary lives. As we get ready for Christmas it is an amazing opportunity to welcome and provide hospitality at our Christmas events and services, and to share the joyful Christmas message of Jesus Christ. But it is also a chance for us to tell the extraordinary ways that we have been noticing God in our ordinary lives this Advent season so that we can share that the story of God's extraordinary love continues today.

Leaving the Bethlehem Candle Unlit

Do you light Advent candles in your Sunday services during Advent?

This year the United Reformed Church is calling on congregations <u>not</u> to light the second Advent candle - often referred to as the **Bethlehem Candle** - as an act of solidarity with our church partners in the Holy Land and all who are suffering there.



The action of keeping the second candle unlit is suggested in memory of all those who have been wounded and killed during the current devastating conflict.

Christian Aid Christmas Appeal

In **Bangladesh**, the Bengali word for Christmas is **Borodin** - or 'the big day'.

Decorations are hung, all kinds of tasty treats are made and there's plenty of singing. Not so different from how we celebrate Christmas in the UK. But the rest of life is different – especially for the women and girls of Bangladesh.

The country is one of the world's most densely-populated. It is low-lying, on a delta of rivers which empty into the Bay of Bengal, and vulnerable to flooding and cyclones. In one of the most disaster-prone areas, Kurigram, in the north, life is challenging. The people who live there have done little to contribute to the climate crisis and yet are among those hardest hit by its effects.

But there is hope. The district is home to an extraordinary group of artisans and entrepreneurs who are embracing new technology to revive traditional crafts such as beadwork, quilting, and making colourful clothing to sell online.



"I didn't have any dreams a few years ago. Now I am in the first year of my degree course. Girls in my locality need education. If they get married at an early age they don't understand the value of education."

Kakoli Khatun

Twenty-one-year-old **Kakoli Khatun** is from Kurigram. In her local area, most people are dependent on farming which can be heavily affected by annual floods. In her community, there is little scope for women and girls to stay in education, with most girls married under the age of 18.

Kakoli wants a different path - to expand her new Nakshi kantha business, making

embroidered quilts using a centuries-old Bengali art tradition, to support her parents and other families in the community.

Khaleda Begum is from the same area; she was married at an early age and said she cannot describe her suffering. She decided to do something for herself and learned to do beadwork.



"From 10am to 12pm when I do my beadwork it's my favourite part of the day."

She describes her daughters as, 'my favourite people in the whole world,' and says,
"I want my children to be educated."

With a little help, women like Kakoli and Khaleda are transforming their lives and looking forward to bright futures. Thanks to supporters throughout the UK, **Christian Aid**'s partner, **Aid Comilla**, has provided training, equipment and funds. They work with women who then bring others on board to start their own enterprises. Training and mentoring are available on everything from gender rights to E-commerce; funds are provided for equipment such as smart phones; and internet access points have been installed to connect this remote area to new global markets.



This year, Christian Aid's Christmas

Appeal is about small changes

which can make a big difference. It's
about helping women and girls find
what they need, be that skills, tools
or funding, to earn a living and break
free from poverty.

More than 5,800 women have been given a chance to shine in Kurigram. Kakoli added, "Now we've had this training, we feel confident and successful."

Christian Aid invites us to help more people use their talents to open up a world of choices. Every prayer, every gift, every action helps transforms lives: £1 could provide two Wi-Fi cards, so women can access online platforms to sell their products from their phone; £23 could provide funds to help one person to start up a small business; and £100 could provide training for five women on e-commerce to introduce them to online business platforms, enhance their knowledge of the digital market, and make effective use of their smartphones.

How can you help? Why not light up your church and community with a carol concert or street carolling? Everything you need to create some festive fun is on the Christian Aid website, including a guide to permissions, a flyer with ideas, carol sheets and sheet music for Christian Aid's song When Out of Poverty is Born.

ECO Tips for Christmas

On behalf of our Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation group (JPIC), Charles Jolly makes some seasonal suggestions:

A Rocha also produced this image of Christmas biscuits to help get us in the Christmas mood! The ideas here that could make a world of difference and a difference to the world. Please consider them prayerfully: why not try one or two or more? And remember: changes, like puppies, are for life and not just for Christmas!

- 1) Start with your Advent calendar. Make sure that the calendar and any chocolates are Fairtrade certified. This ensures that workers in poor countries are paid a fair wage and encourages them to farm in an ecologically sustainable way.
- 2) Save a tree. Dress up a living tree outside [with (rechargeable) battery fairy lights]. Add fat balls and feeders for the birds. Or plant a living tree with good roots in a substantial pot, keep it watered and bring indoors each Christmas.



3) Make a natural wreath & decorations. Buy or collect small amounts of holly sprigs, ivy, pine-cones, rose hips from bushes that are growing wild if you can do so

safely and without trespassing. [Note: collecting from the wild is illegal if done for any commercial purpose.] Then get creative!

- 4) Re-use cards & wrapping. Cut gift tags from old cards & make reusable drawstring gift bags for family and friends from remnants of fabric and ribbons. Recycled brown paper has a lower footprint than Christmas wrapping paper and young children may enjoy decorating it.
- **5) Create home-made gifts.** For example: baked goods or buy a pretty glass jar from a charity shop and fill with chocolates or flowers. A kilner jar or similar filled with small items also makes an attractive gift.
- **6) Make sure your gifts don't cost the earth.** Try to avoid products made with unsustainable palm oil. That is not easy but this web-site provides comprehensive guidance on products and shops: https://www.ethicalconsumer.org/palm-oil/palm-oil-free-list.
- 7) Give the gift of time. Maybe you can think of something, say, once a month for a year that someone would appreciate. You could then make a voucher and enclose it in a card. Examples: coffee meet-up, mowing the lawn, dog walk, grocery shopping, babysitting.



- 8) Dim the lights. LED Christmas lights save energy. If you have suitable holders and can afford it, use candles or tea-lights made from beeswax, soy, coconut or other vegetable source. Avoid paraffin-wax candles: they are cheaper but that's more fossil fuels producing CO2.
- **9) Remember the reason for the season.** Can you think of someone who would otherwise spend Christmas Day on their own to invite to join you? It will also reduce energy consumption because they will share your heating and cooking!
- **10) Would your family consider a meat-free Christmas meal?** If they insist on meat rather than a tasty vegetarian or vegan dish, make sure that it is free-range or organic and if possible from a local farmer or independent retailer. Avoid lamb or beef (ruminants produce lots of methane).
- 11) Review your recycling. To be sure about what your local authority recycles enter your postcode to this web-site: https://www.recyclenow.com/recycling-locator. NB Always remove sellotape. And if Christmas wrapping paper springs back after scrunching, it isn't recyclable!
- **12) Continue the good habits started at Christmas through the coming year.**[We'll think about New Year Resolutions next month!]


