# Opening Reflection by Revd Geoffrey Clarke Moderator of the East Midlands Synod

### Enough to Get By



In these times of financial pressure and hardship – as individuals and as congregations – having "enough" equates to something along the lines "enough to get by". The image of scarcity dominates our budgets and mindsets. Many of us know the challenge of trying to make savings in what we spend; having the central heating on for less time and/or at a lower temperature (and for some maybe not turning it on at all); and working out what we might now regard as luxury rather than necessity. All of these efforts are not in order to accumulate bigger bank balances but merely to "get by".

And this year Christmas itself may well have been subjected to greater scrutiny. Where can we make savings on our Christmas plans? How can we have a Christmas in which we "get by" and how can we minimise the chance of having to pay back across the next few months what we have spent at Christmas? And whilst it is all too easy to admit that many of us buy more food and "stuff" than we need, it is a much bigger challenge

and discipline to forego some of the treats and indulgences we enjoy – particularly if we regard this time of year as an opportunity to compensate for the tough times we have faced together across the year.

## From Get By to Be With

By contrast, at the heart of Christmas is the affirmation that God is the source of infinitely more than "enough to get by":

And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. (John 1: 14, New Revised Standard Version)

By becoming flesh and living among us God enables us to do more than simply "get by". The birth of the Christ Child is God's pledge to **be with us**. As one of us, donned in our flesh and loving among us, God embraces the budgets and mindsets of scarcity and reveals a glory, grace and truth that are found not in the expensive and extravagant of presents but in that precious and life-giving of gestures – "presence", being with us. In one of the less well-used carols, **Thomas Pestel** puts it this way:

Behold the great Creator makes himself a house of clay, a robe of human flesh he takes which he will wear for aye. Hark, hark, the wise Eternal Word like a weak infant cries! See in a servant's form the Lord as God in cradle lies. (Rejoice and Sing: 171: 1-2)

Our budgets may be so tight that the best we can hope for is to "get by", but the great Creator opts not for palace but *house of clay*. As the wonderful hymn in Philippians puts it: *Christ Jesus ...\_did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness* (Philippians 2: 5-7). God came among us to *be with us*. God's presence enables us to "get by" and to have "enough" and more besides.

Last Christmas I found inspiration in **The Humble Church**, by **Martyn Percy**, former Dean of Christ Church, Oxford. This Advent I have been reading it again. I offer these words in the hope that they will renew our sense of God's presence with us – and transform our budgets and mindsets to reflect God's grace and truth:

The grounding of the incarnation lies in God choosing to become flesh – Jesus dwelling among us, and sharing our life with all its pain, uncertainty and anxiety, as well as hope, joy and love. In Bethlehem 2,000 years ago, God enters history in an entirely new, decisive way – yet it is done in the midst of squalor, birth, potential shame (Joseph is not the father) and on a journey that no one is exempt from, as the military and political masters of the region have decreed that there will be a census. Christmas cards depicting nativity scenes, however, are often deceptive. Most portrayals of Jesus' birth offer clean-swept stables, fresh straw, unvarnished oak and pine, and thick woollen shawls and throws, that sanitise and romanticise poverty; a country-style birth straight from the glossy pages of an up-market home furnishing catalogue. The truth is probably more surprising; Jesus was surrounded by animals and filth, with nought for company save a few rough shepherds.

"Nought for company save a few rough shepherds." Christmas invites us to remember that we have his company – God-with-us – not because we deserve it but because God chose to do so.

Join then, all hearts that are not stone, and all our voices prove, to celebrate this Holy One, the God of peace and love. (Rejoice and Sing: 171: 5)


## Join our Evening Prayers for Advent


## **Holocaust Memorial Day Resource for Churches**

The theme for **Holocaust Memorial Day** (HMD) on **27 January 2023** is 'Ordinary People'. **CCJ** are delighted to launch their Holocaust Memorial Day resource for churches for 2023, with reflections from a broad range of community leaders and scholars. CCJ explain that the resource develops the theme, set by the

Holocaust Memorial Day Trust, of 'Ordinary People': because it was ordinary people who lost their lives in the Holocaust, it was ordinary people who perpetrated unthinkable acts of cruelty and murder and it was ordinary people who performed heroic acts to save others. What can we as ordinary people do in our communities today to remember and stand together?



The resource contains reflections from two CCL Presidents, **Rabbi Jonathan Wittenberg** and **Revd Fiona Smith**, as well as a reflection from **His Eminence Archbishop Angaelos**, on the importance of marking HMD as people of faith. It also includes practical advice for churches on how to commemorate the Holocaust in churches, prayers for HMD, all genocides, and Christian-Jewish relations, and four reflections on ordinary people who demonstrated extraordinary faith. 
