### **Fruitful Ends and Fresh Beginnings**



A new year – a moment to look forward. Like Skegness in the old railway poster, it's so bracing. Time to lever ourselves out of the warm bath of Christmas tradition and step out into the icy showers of January.

Christmas can be a bit backward-looking if we let it: 'tis the season to recreate childhood rituals, give another airing to old songs and old movies, bask in the cathode-ray glow of *The Snowman* or Morecambe and Wise. In church, too, there's a danger that our manger scenes descend into mere commemoration, cosily swaddled in Victorian verse. (How long, do you think, before our repertoire is joined by a carol that's Carolean?)

I let Christmas go reluctantly, clinging to the fairy lights all the way to Twelfth Night, the last holdout on the street. But even I had to pull the tree down in the end.

Over the twelve days of Christmas, two much more significant trees also came down. First to fall was the "Hardy tree", a treasured landmark in Old St Pancras churchyard. Back in the 1860s an apprentice architect, charged with disinterring the graves to make way for the railway lines into King's Cross and St Pancras stations, decided to stand the discarded gravestones in serried rings around the trunk of an ash. The architect was **Thomas Hardy**, future novelist, and the striking image he fashioned of life emerging from death endured until this Christmas past.





Then, a few days after the demise of the Hardy tree, down came the venerable <u>wych elm</u> – thought to be Europe's oldest – that had guarded the gateway to **Beauly Priory** in Inverness-shire for a staggering 800 years, witness to centuries of human history.

In the Bible and elsewhere, trees are often metaphors for fruitfulness and longevity, flourishing well beyond the bounds of a human lifespan. Planting a tree is an act of faith in the future. We do it for our children's children. So when a beloved old tree crashes to earth, it tells an uncomfortable truth: even these symbols of permanence are not immune to death. Dear ones and dynasties, places and institutions (up to and including churches, denominations and nations) – all are finite. However much we might love them, however much we might define ourselves by them, someday they must end.

Perhaps that's why the Hardy tree and the Beauly elm have been so lamented. Knowing their tree's days to be numbered, the villagers of Beauly last year held a festival in its honour and memorialised it in a stunning <u>3D scan</u>. They can look back in style.

But a case from the East Midlands points to a healthier perspective: look ahead, and every end is a beginning. In Bramcote Hills Park, pride of place was long held by a glorious beech, over two centuries old – a living link to the long-gone mansion whose estate this once was. I used to admire it every day as I wheeled my children to nursery. Then, one blustery morning in 2012, its mighty trunk lay flat on the grass.

However, the park keepers had anticipated this, building an enclosure carefully calibrated to contain its fall. And it has lain within ever since, resplendent in its natural afterlife as a haven of biodiversity. Even the owl and squirrel which were carved by chainsaw into its broken limbs are weathering away now, but the decaying trunk remains a thriving hub of new growth and wildlife, surrounded by native plants and flowers. Better even than Hardy's ash, Bramcote's beech has become an emblem of death and rebirth.



This is God's way of working. Sometimes it means we have to let go of something we cherish if something new is to flourish in its place; at the very least, to prune and to pollard as well as to plant. Bracingly, that might apply to our lives and our churches as well as our parks and gardens. God is forever making things new – and in the process transforming broken people into "oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that he may be glorified" (Isaiah 61:3).

Even Christmas can point us forward if we let it. The myrrh of Epiphany is a foretaste of Good Friday, when for our sake Christ, "the shoot of the stump of Jesse", will himself hang on a tree. Then onward to Easter Day, when he will break death's hold on us in the miracle of resurrection. Then we can claim our places in the one Kingdom that never ends.

So: out with the old year. In with the new. What planting and what uprooting will we do in 2023, so that God may work new wonders?

# **Around the East Midlands**

### **Ordination Anniversary Celebrations for Revd John Reardon**



East Midlands Synod Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** was among those who joined the congregation at **Newport Pagnell URC** to celebrate the Revd John Reardon's 60<sup>th</sup> Ordination Anniversary. The congregation also included members of John and Molly's family, members of West End United Church and representatives of Trinity, St Alban's (where John ministered and lived during his Church House and Council of Churches in Britain & Ireland days).

The service was conducted by Newport Pagnell and West End minister the **Revd Jo Clare-Young** with the Moderator as preacher. During the service John was presented with his 60<sup>th</sup> ordination anniversary certificate and John and Molly received a gift and flowers from the church. Lunch followed in the Mead Centre and included a **celebration cake**, duly cut by John and Molly, and a further gift of a framed copy of a newspaper from the date of John's Ordination: 12 December 1962.



John's Year Book entry states that his ministry began in 1961, a year before his ordination. This was due, he explained, to having to sit and pass a final exam before Ordination a year after commencing in ministry. The congregation, therefore, celebrated **sixty-one years of ministry**. John and Molly's partnership preceded his ministry so throughout she has been his support. John paid tribute to Newport Pagnell church members for the welcome and support extended to him and Molly throughout their 23 years living there in retirement.

John's local church ministries were at Horsham (1961-68) and Trinity, St Alban's (1968-72); at Church House as the United Reformed Church's first Departmental Secretary for Church and Society (1972-90); and as Deputy General Secretary (1983-90). The denomination's respect and affection for John was reflected in his election to serve as Moderator of General Assembly (1995-96) and his ecumenical conviction was recognised in his appointment as General Secretary of the Council of Churches for Britain and Ireland (1990-99).

Also present in the congregation was another of the Synod's retired ministers, the **Revd John Chisholm**, who worships at Newport Pagnell. John served in Japan before training for ministry. His local church ministries were at Grange, Bebington and St George's, Hemel Hempstead.

# On the Death of His Holiness, Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI



Following the death of His Holiness, **Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI**, the **Revd Dr John Bradbury**, General Secretary of the United Reformed Church said:

"The papacy has been one of the causes of deep division within the western churches but the fruits of the ecumenical movement are many. Today we mourn the loss of a baptised brother in Christ.

We lament the remaining divisions between the churches as we respond to Christ's call to seek unity. We also celebrate moments when the Bishop of Rome speaks with a voice on the world stage out of our common faith for justice, peace, and the flourishing of all creation. In such moments we catch a glimpse of what it means that the Bishop of Rome is a focus of unity of the whole Church.

We give thanks for the faithful way **Benedict XVI** exercised that ministry and uphold all who mourn him in our prayers. May he rest in peace and rise in glory".

He served in: Malaya (1960-65); Plymouth (1965-73), St Andrew's, Southampton (1973-79); St John's, Kenton (1979-89) and Princes Street, Norwich (1989-97) before retiring to Harpenden. Derek's funeral will be held on Thursday 19 January at 12:30pm at St Nicholas' Church of England in Harpenden. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and friends.

### Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territory

In June 2021 the URC General Assembly received a report and passed ten resolutions in response to the situation in Israel and the Occupied Palestinian Territory.



URC Children's and Youth Work and URC Commitment for Life (who partner with Christian Aid and Global Justice Now) have produced a two-part booklet for 5-11s and 11-14s to help them get a glimpse into the background and life for children and young people in that region and to explain the URC's stance.

# **Electrical Tests in Churches and Manses**

East Midlands Synod Property Officer, **Geoff Milnes** shares the following with us:

"A church asked me recently about the need for electrical tests in Churches and Manses, though the specific question was about **PAT** (Portable Appliance Test) testing. The position is this:

- PAT testing must be carried out ANNUALLY. This will involve things like kettles, toasters, church laptops and computers, printers, shredders, phone chargers, and the like. It must include personal electrical items if they are used on the premises – if someone unknowingly brings a faulty electrical device to church and plugs it into the church electrics, it could cause damage to the church's electrical circuits, and possible even cause a fire.
- 2. Manses should have their fixed wiring/electrical circuits tested at no more than TEN year intervals.
- 3. Churches MUST (it is a legal requirement) have their fixed wiring/electrical circuits tested every FIVE years.

As an aside, all Church buildings and Manses must have smoke alarms fitted on each floor, ideally on hallway and landing ceilings. Don't put them in kitchens or bathrooms as the smoke from burning toast or steam from showers etc can set them off. Alarms should be tested every month, and batteries replaced annually or when the alarm starts to 'bleep'.

Carbon Monoxide detectors must be installed/placed next to any fossil fuel burning appliance e.g. gas and oil boilers, gas fires. Carbon Monoxide is produced when fuel is not burnt properly and is an indicator that the appliance is faulty. It is a lethal gas that cannot be smelt or seen and is known as the ' silent killer' as it gets into the lungs and stops them working properly. If your lungs don't work.....

Please make sure that our Churches and Manses are as safe as we can make them."
