Opening Reflection by the Revd Camilla Veitch East Midlands Synod Clerk



Yesterday I saw my first snowdrop of the year. It was only tiny with a small white bud but it was still a snowdrop. It made me so happy to see it — a sign of hope and promise of things to come. It offered reassurance that the barrenness of winter will not last for ever. Spring will come! Colour, blossom and new life will emerge from the cold earth once again.

We know this, of course. And yet when the twinkle of Christmas and the excitement of New Year are a distant memory and the days of January and February are gloomy and the ground bare it is not always so easy to believe that spring is round the corner.

Hope is essential for human beings to keep going, when we are not yet where we long to be. Hope keeps us going in the waiting time.

It helps enormously, though, if there is some tangible sign of what we hope for. Whilst our faith enables us to hope even for things which we cannot see, it is so much easier to hold on to hope when it is tangible. It is easier to believe that love is stronger than evil when an act of injustice is met with an act of kindness. If you are feeling lonely or are struggling in some ways, it makes it easier to believe that things will get better if a friend comes alongside you and is rooting for you. It is easier

for people to believe in a God of love when they see Christians doing acts of kindness in their community. Just as many of our churches have done during the pandemic and the energy crisis – supporting foodbanks or offering warm spaces for example.

At Christmas we remembered God taking flesh in Jesus – making his presence with humanity tangible in the story of his birth. It's as if God knows that it is not enough for us to have words to hold on to – we need tangible signs of his presence with us and the hope he brings.

As we begin a new year, can we take the message of Christmas with us and make it tangible in our churches and communities? There are many who are looking for signs of hope in the world around us, as they struggle to heat their homes or make ends meet. Can we be the embodiment of hope for others around us? Can we embody the good news of Jesus whose love has the power to touch, transform and heal? We follow a God



who took human form to show us that he is with us. Let us follow his example and show in tangible ways the love of God to our communities. If you have any stories of making hope tangible in your church and community, please share it with us through the e-letter!

This will be my last e-letter reflection as **Synod Clerk**, as I stand down on 31 January. I feel privileged to have served the Synod in this role for two years and thank the Moderator and Synod staff for their support in my duties. I pray that a successor will soon be identified and called to this ministry.

From JPIC: The Two COPs

In the bleak mid-winter, when above average temperatures are a Godsend to help cut heating costs, global warming may feel a distant worry. Not so in Pakistan, Somalia and the Maldives. But before we start feeling too gloomy about rising global temperatures, we can celebrate two very hopeful advances at **COP27** and **COP15**, not to mention the election of Lula da Silva 'at the eleventh hour for the Amazon rain-forest'. Indeed, when our children look back, they may see 2022 as the year when the outlook for the environment turned a corner.



climate COP27 was, sadly, very disappointing in terms of improved pledges to keep global warming below 1.5°C. Indeed, using the latest data from IPCC Working Group 3, the global 'carbon budget' to keep within 1.5°C warming may only last about six years at current emissions levels. The big advance in 2022, however, was that there was at last an agreement to pay poor countries that are

'on the front line' for 'loss and damage' from climate change. This is an essential part of Climate Justice. How this financial help will be delivered and who will provide the money remains to be worked out – the massive profits of fossil fuel companies are a popular target with many.

At the risk of stating the obvious, the UK needs to more than halve our 'consumption' carbon emissions by 2030 (i.e. In about seven years' time) in order to make a fair contribution to the global effort. [UK consumption emissions include air and sea travel and carbon embedded in imports — on that measure (smoothing out the effect of Covid-19) there has been only a comparatively small drop since 1990.]

Christian Climate Action is working towards a huge protest outside the Houses of Parliament on Friday 21

April to demand the massive government action required; this demonstration needs to be backed up by churches and individuals setting an example by large cuts to our own carbon footprints, which is where **Eco Church** can help.

The agreement reached at **Biodiversity COP15** (chaired by China and hosted by Canada), just before the end of the year, was even more momentous, but could easily have been unnoticed in the run-up to Christmas. It is known as the 'Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (GBF)' and it seeks to stop biodiversity loss, restore ecosystems and protect indigenous rights. The headline agreement is '30% by 2030', which environmentalists have been striving for over many years and which we can see as an answer to prayer. The GBF means that 30% of the planet and 30% of degraded ecosystems should be under protection by 2030. Many environmentalists think that this needs to be increased to 50%, but if 30% can be achieved it will be a real 'game changer'.

This is so important because we are facing drastic reductions in wildlife numbers and the potential extinction of around a million species of plants and animals – the worst since an asteroid wiped out the dinosaurs. Anthropogenic global warming and climate change is a major factor, not to mention pollution, but even more serious are land-use change (e.g. clearing rainforests to grow food for farm animals) and over-exploitation (ask a dodo). As with the mitigation of global warming, richer countries will have to provide finance for developing countries to enable the changes needed. Of course, it's a win-win because healthy eco-systems will sequester more CO2. Encouragingly, the EU is developing an ambitious Nature Restoration Law; we must chivvy our MPs to emulate this in the UK. Please note also that <u>A Rocha</u> can provide speakers to inspire us in acting locally to encourage biodiversity and help protect God's wonderful Creation.



It is always moving to make a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, there is so much to experience and learn together. St Jerome said, "Five gospels record the life of Jesus. Four you will find in books and the one you will find in the land they call Holy." Read the fifth gospel and the world of the four will open for you. I invite you to come and know this for yourselves, whether you are new to the Holy Land or have been many times before. Reading the gospels will never be the same again and by visiting the Holy Land we are standing in solidarity with our brothers and sisters there too; to have the chance to meet the 'living stones', the local Palestinian and Israeli Christians, who are the ongoing, living church in the region, is humbling.

Our pilgrimage will include the sites where the most important events in Our Lord's life and ministry took place: in Jerusalem and the surrounding area and further north in Galilee. We hope that if you have never been on pilgrimage to the Holy Land before you will choose to join us and, if you have been before, we welcome you back. Our journey is a life-changing as well as faith-changing experience.



Taking in Bethlehem, Nazareth and Caesarea as well as key sites in and around Jerusalem, the pilgrimage costs £2,755 per person – but bookings received by 31 January will receive an early bird discount, reducing the full cost of the tour to £2,585. This includes flights, accommodation and full board, as well as all travel and fees while overseas (a supplement is payable for single rooms).

Families on Faith Adventures - Materials Available




Families on Faith Adventures @ Home has now drawn to a close, but the materials produced over the last two and a half years are still available on their website.


