Opening Reflection by the Revd Nigel Adkinson Deputy Convenor of Ordained Ministries and Churches Group and Synod Terms of Settlement Officer

"Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God".

This quote is from **Cornelia "Corrie" ten Boom**, a Dutch Christian who, along with her father and other family members, helped many Jews escape the Nazi Holocaust during World War II and was imprisoned for it.

We have just begun the season of Lent, a time in the church calendar when we remember Jesus' time in the wilderness. We remember his desert wanderings, alone with nature, facing the hot desert days and the cold desert nights; a time where Jesus' relationship with God was tested, but where his spiritual strength won through his time of testing.



I'm sure we can recall in our own lives those wilderness times, whether long or short. We may be experiencing them now, both individually and in the life of our churches. I believe those of us who seek to live our lives as Christians often find ourselves in the wilderness, cast out by a society that wants to ignore us and push us to the margins. Where everything seems to be collapsing around us, where things no longer seem to make sense to us and where the world so often seems a frightening place.

Our wilderness times can be triggered by many things: illness, family difficulties, loss of job, loss of loved ones, and more besides. It is at these times that the God we know says, "trust me; nothing can separate you from my love." This may be difficult for us to recognise in the loneliness of our wilderness times, yet through the love and support of friends, God's love can and is revealed and shared with us.

Corrie ten Boom knew what it was like to live a life of fear, in a time of wilderness and grave uncertainty, yet through the God known to her, she trusted and her fear was overcome.

Trusting in the love of people we know and whom we have come to trust, is an amazing blessing. To know the love of an ever-present God is an even greater blessing. The first disciples lived through wilderness times. What greater wilderness time could there be for them, than to see the leader they loved and had followed die on a cross. Yet for them and for us, that death brings hope and new life through Christ's resurrection. So, as we travel through Lent and recall our own times of wilderness and those of the first disciples, may we live as a people of hope, worshipping a God from whose love in Jesus Christ we can never be separated.

May we all know the touch of the living Christ as we make our Lenten journeys, walking the way of the Cross to a life of resurrection and new beginnings.

Mission Development Officer

This is a full-time post for 37.5 hours/week (including evening and weekends) on a permanent contract.

Salary: £40,000 per annum for a lay person or a minister from outside the URC. A URC minister will receive the current ministerial stipend, a manse and related benefits in accordance with the Plan for Partnership. This post is subject to an Enhanced DBS Disclosure.

The purpose of this role is to help equip churches in their missional discipleship and growth and to facilitate the sharing of good news, practice and opportunities across the Synod and beyond, holding the whole-of-life discipleship ethos of Walking the Way at the heart of their work.

The successful candidate will work to promote, encourage and undertake the promotion of mission to the whole people of God to facilitate the development of the life of the church at all levels by helping churches to identify and understand their particular priorities in mission and, to develop and release people to engage in that mission.

Synod Safeguarding Officer

The East Midlands Synod of the United Reformed Church is seeking to appoint a **Synod Safeguarding Officer** (Ref SSO). This is a part-time post for 17.5 hours per week (including evening and weekends) on a permanent contract. Salary is £38,239 pro-rata (actual salary £17,845). This post is subject to an Enhanced DBS Disclosure.

Safeguarding children and adults at risk is a core part of the Church's mission, and the Synod Safe- guarding Officer is essential to promoting that mission. Working within the structures of the United Reformed Church, their role is:

- 1. To lead on safeguarding matters and be a trusted advocate for safeguarding in the Synod.
- 2. To advise and support the synod and local Churches in child and adult protection matters.
- 3. To ensure that disclosures and allegations of harm, abuse or neglect are appropriately referred to the statutory authorities and that appropriate advice and support is given to survivors of abuse
- 4. To manage safeguarding cases including liaison with other relevant agencies and services such as the police, children, probation and adult social care services
- 5. To ensure regular safeguarding training for ministers, workers and those responsible for the care of children and/or adults at risk in the synod and the local churches
- 6. To keep accurate records, data and information and produce relevant reports.
- 7. To keep abreast of developments in safeguarding within and outside the URC and maintain appropriate links

King Charles visits Christ the Cornerstone

URC minister the **Revd George Mwaura** featured in the <u>local press</u> recently, as he welcomed **His Majesty King Charles III** on a visit to the **Church of Christ the Cornerstone**. The church was the venue for the ceremony in which His Majesty formally conferred city status on Milton Keynes, following its successful bid as part of Queen Elizabeth's Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Members of the bid team were among the guests, alongside representatives of the city's communities and charities and Ukrainian refugees with their host families. Revd Mwaura was joined as host by the Mayor, **Clir Amanda Marlow**, and other dignitaries.

In his speech, His Majesty recognised that although Milton Keynes may be known as a "new town", it has been a settled community as long ago as the Bronze Age. The ceremony also included the singing of the Olney hymn to mark 250 years of Amazing Grace. Before proceeding to visit the city's Foodbank, His Majesty unveiled a commemorative plaque and added his autograph to the Church Book, which was previously signed by Her late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II when she conducted the official opening of the newly built Church of Christ the Cornerstone back in 1992.

Each month, a medal and certificate will be awarded to one of the nominated children and young people, along with a financial gift of £100 to be spent to benefit children and/or young people in the church, synod or

Good work can be interpreted in many different ways, so there are no hard and fast categories for this award. Suggested nomination areas are:

- a young carer
- a young person running a holiday club
- a child volunteering at a dementia café
- a young person fund raising for a Messy Church outing
- a young person providing live music for services
- a child raising money for an overseas development project
- a young person training older people in the use of technology
- a child who turns up early every week to set out the chairs for a club
- a young person volunteering as a peer mentor at college
- anyone under 26 who is playing their part in the mission of God in any way

Anyone under the age of 25 can be nominated and anybody can make a nomination at any time of the year. To make a nomination, download and complete a nomination form and send it by post or email to <u>trainingpa@urc5.org.uk</u>

You will also need to get the nominee (and their parents if they are under 18) to sign the form to show they agree to you sending us their details.
