# Opening Reflection by the Revd Geoffrey Clarke Moderator of the East Midlands Synod

#### *Is it worth bothering ....?*

My late paternal grandmother excelled at both baking and cooking. She baked her own bread and it was a real treat to eat it as it if were cake, still warm and with a taste that was sublime. Granny's cooking and baking guaranteed that any meal with her was delicious.

As a farmer my grandfather knew that his tiring and physical work, out in all weathers, was rewarded with hearty meals. He died when I was in my late teens and it took a few visits to my grandmother to realise that she was no longer cooking or baking; bread bought from the shop replaced her beautiful homemade bread. One day I asked her, "Are you not making bread any longer?" She replied, "It's not worth bothering now there's only me to eat it".

Looking back I recall feeling sad – for her and, if I'm honest, for me (in that I was no longer likely to be treated to her wonderful bread). Over the years her response has been evident in my encounters with those who have lost loved ones through bereavement or as a result of leaving home to live elsewhere. In the absence of those with whom they have shared a home and table they have concluded "it's not worth bothering now there's only me/us".



Baking and cooking and sharing a table with those closest to us are a significant element of daily life and especially on special occasions. For many it is particularly so at Christmas. One of the most common of conversational questions at this time of the year tends to be, "What are you doing for Christmas?", articulated in the accompanying questions, "Who are you having for Christmas? Are they coming to you or are you going to theirs?" In short, "With whom will you be eating your Christmas meal?" I am always careful, in any such conversations, to ensure that hurt and harm are not inflicted on those who will be alone; those for whom the coming-together for Christmas rubs their noses in the fact they will be with no one.

In the approach to Christmas 2020 there has been considerable speculation about whether or not the pandemic restrictions would prohibit people gathering around the tables of their homes. Good reasons suggested that it might be unwise to allow it; good reasons underlined the impact on the mental health of many if it were prohibited. The reality is that whilst it is possible to do so within very narrow confines it has forced many to agonise over whom to meet up with and, inevitably, who not to see. Many have concluded, "It's not worth bothering".

And that "not bothering" has extended to other elements of Christmas. If no one is coming to stay, is worth bothering having a tree or putting up Christmas decorations? In company with my late grandmother, is it worth bothering with festive fare if it's just me/us?

The timeless message at the heart of this season – all too easily obscured by the accompanying customary expectations that have almost smothered it – is that *God bothered with this world of ours*. Regardless of what our homes and tables, our hearts and heads are like *God bothers with us*. God bothered to the extent that, as St John put it, *... the Word became flesh and lived among us* (John 1: 14a) and *... God so loved the world that he gave his only Son* (John 3: 16a). In that Word made Flesh we glimpse the God who *bothers* with the unloved and the lost, the broken and desperate, the hurting and harmed. In Jesus we see God's "yes" to the question, "Is it worth bothering?"

In his poem, *Performance for an Audience of One*, Gerard Kelly speaks of God performing a drama whose Act 2 features *the cry of a child in a vastly empty universe*, building up to *an unimagined finale: a cosmos, purged of guilt, restored, dressed for dancing.* The closing stanza affirms for us, the audience:

If you had been the only one, your grimy pounds the total take, he still would have staged the whole show and wept for joy at the warmth of your applause.

May the God made manifest in the One born in Bethlehem inspire not only our applause but our commitment to *bother* – making bread and breaking bread even when we're tempted to give up or give in.


### **Christmas around the East Midlands**

## **Practical information for churches: charitable status**

#### **Registration with the Charity Commission**

Synod Property Officer Geoff Milnes has glad tidings to share:

Some of you may be aware that it was the Government's intention to require all nonregistered or exempt charities to register with the Charity Commission by the end of **March 2021**. That would have included most of our churches – those with an income of over £5,000 but less than £100,000 – and would have required churches to send annual accounts to the Charity Commission for inspection. Those with incomes of over £100,000 are already registered.

The GOOD NEWS is that the Government, driven partly by the effects of the Covid virus on working patterns and also by reductions in staff, have decided to extend the period of exemption from registration by **10 years** subject to the necessary approval by Parliament, which should be a fairly straightforward matter. It is likely that registration will be carried out in phases over the next 10 years. More details will come from the Government over time.

It is with sadness that we record the deaths of the following four ministers.

The **South Western Synod** informs us that serving minister the **Revd Amanda Harper** died peacefully on Thursday 26 November, following an aggressive cancer. Amanda was inducted as minister of Southernhay URC, Exeter in September 2016. Amanda was in the Baptist ministry 1990-1993; Hazel Grove 1993-1997; Chaplaincy, Southampton University 1997-2004; West Sussex Area Ministry 2006-2009; Christ Church, Dulwich & Herne Hill United 2009-2014; Southern Synod 2014-2015; St. Mark's, Greenwich United Church 2015-2016; Exeter University Chaplain 2016-2017 and Exeter, Southernhay 2016-2020. Our prayers are with her family and friends as well as with the people of Southernhay.

The **West Midlands Synod** informs us of the death on Saturday 28 November of one of its retired ministers, the **Revd Rosemary Humphrey**. Rosemary served at North Tawton & Okehampton 1978-1982; Axminster 1982-1985; Charmouth & Seaton 1985-1987; and Lynton 1990-1994. Latterly, she was living in a retirement home in Coventry. We hold in prayer all those who loved Rosemary.


The **North Western Synod** informs us that its retired minister the **Revd Noel Stancliff** died on the evening of Thursday 3 December at Furness Hospital. Noel served at Melbourne & Repton 1985–1987; and Church Stretton 1988 – 1999. We remember his widow, Kathy, and their family.

Finally, the **South Western Synod** also informs us that one of its retired ministers, the **Revd John Salsbury**, died peacefully on Saturday 5 December following a short illness. John served at Alfreton & Selston 1964-68; Rake Lane, Wallasey 1968-76; Lecturer, Congregational College, Manchester 1972-76; Clitheroe with Newton-in-Bowland & Barrow 1976-88; Thropton & Rothbury 1988-96; & Birdhopecraig with Otterburn 1992-96; and Henleaze, Bristol 1996-2001.

John's son the Revd David Salsbury notes his father's strong associations with the East Midlands. John was brought up in Long Eaton and worked at Boots the Chemist as a pharmacist before training for ministry and serving his first pastorate in Alfreton and Selston.

Due to Covid-19 restrictions a funeral service for family and close friends, by invitation, will be held on Thursday 31 December 2020. A further online service of thanksgiving and celebration for John's life will be held early in the New Year. Please hold John's wife Marjory and their family in your prayers.
