Opening Reflection by the Revd George Mwaura

Convenor of the Ordained Ministry & Churches Group (OMCG)

Friends,

The season of **Pentecost** is with us and with it a sense of hope that something new and good is going to happen in our lives and communities. The last 18 months or so have been a catastrophe on a global scale as a result of the pandemic. Millions have lost their lives, jobs and traditional businesses have been wiped out. The devastation has been in all sectors of life, the church not being an exception.

The origin of the SARS Covid-19 virus remains an academic exercise with some folks favouring the zoonotic angle, while a renewed section led by America is challenging China's role in the creation and spread of the virus, perhaps accidentally. What is not in any doubt however, is the effects the pandemic has had on global communities, our churches included. Many, including here in our own Synod, have had to close or are in the process of closing. The prolonged financial exposure has left them vulnerable while largely elderly congregations are fearful of returning of to any physical meetings. Witnessing the devastation that new variants are causing, their fear is justified.

Amid this gloomy picture, we read the words of Isaiah with a heightened sense of expectation and hope: ...see I am doing something new! Now it springs up, do you not see it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland (Isaiah 43:19).

It's in this sense of expectation that I start my stint as the convener of **OMCG** (to be more accurate, I started after March's Synod meeting). The role is a challenging yet exciting one as it allows the Convenor to interact widely with the whole Synod, listening, facilitating and walking alongside the churches. It's a pivotal moment in the life of the



churches and the role calls for pastoral sensitivity as these church fellowships are at the moment walking in fear of what the future holds. To walk with them in their hour of need will call for compassion and care from all of us and not just the Convenor. To these churches, Isaiah speaks hope of renewal and 'green shoots' emerging from the chaos of the pandemic.

And yes, even though we have sadly closed some churches and will in all honesty likely close some more, new ways of doing and being church are being embraced by fellowships and individuals who would not have dreamt of such radical technological adjustments in their lives 17 months ago! When I led virtual worship at **Newport Pagnell URC** a couple of months ago, the first person to log on was a 90-year-old who said to me they no longer miss any service because they can attend it from the comfort of their living room come rain or snow!

Admittedly, Zoom meetings are not an exact replica of physical meetings and certainly Zoom coffee doesn't have the same aroma! But Zoom and other digital platforms are a new way of life and they replace old ways that we need to leave behind as we strive to locate a balance between our worship and our responsibility to this planet. I might not get the same buzz from a virtual OMCG meeting but just imagine the savings we are making for our Synods and the wider global reduction in Co2 by holding virtual meetings. Granted, there will always be some aspects of church life and business that demand physical attention.

The coming of the **Holy Spirit** as Christ had promised his disciples in lockdown (the upper room of Acts 1:13) heralded a new chapter in the disciples' lives. Hitherto timid, uneducated folks from Galilee started preaching and doing ministry in ways that have shaken and transformed the world for over two thousand years. I strongly believe that this same Spirit is abroad today! We might feel desperate as the pandemic sweeps across the globe and closes some of our church fellowships, but let's not forget others have been there before us. The disciples must have felt as if their entire world had collapsed after Christ's death on Good Friday and certainly a sense of being orphaned when he ascended to heaven. But life took a new and dramatic turn for them when the Spirit came on Pentecost Sunday and I am more than hopeful that this Spirit of Renewal will do the same for us. The church of Christ has survived unbelievable persecution and hardship over the centuries and I have no doubt it will outlive the present upheaval.

In the meanwhile, be sensible and be safe. Go and keep your vaccine appointment if you are invited. A healthy population means that we can keep the doors of our churches open.

May the Spirit be with you!

The **Synod Finance Group** met last month and considered many items, but wishes the following to be passed on to churches for early consideration, please.

Finance Group considered a way for churches to calculate **M&M offers** for 2022. As this will be based on the 2020 accounts, a 'revision' is being developed and accounts information will be used to assist and avoid 'distorted' calculations in many instances.

Most church financial years end in December and accounts should normally be completed and copies sent to the office by 31 March each year, or 3 months after the financial year ends if a different date is used.

It is fully recognised that there may well have been difficulties in preparation and getting the accounts inspected (audited as appropriate) and then agreed by Elders. If this has been done - great - please send to the office without delay. Thanks for those received already.

Where it has not been possible yet to get the accounts agreed then please send in the draft accounts, again without delay.




