One of the joys at this time of year is to drive down Nottingham's University Boulevard when the **rhododendrons** are in bloom. Great swathes of colour – magenta and crimson, pink and white. Rhododendrons really became popular in Britain during early Victorian times and it was all through one man, **Joseph Hooker**. 
What is the future for our churches? How can we connect with more of the people around us? What does God want us to continue doing, to stop doing – or perhaps even to begin?

These are pressing questions for many of us, thrown into sharper relief by the Covid-19 pandemic. As restrictions begin to ease, this is a moment to reconsider. You are warmly invited to explore topics such as these in friendly company with our virtual reading group, running on Zoom for five weeks from **Wednesday 28 April**.

We will be working our way through **Steve Aisthorpe**'s stimulating book **Rewilding the Church**, which prompted the theme of our recent Synod Meeting. **Aisthorpe** urges us to take heart from the ecological concept of reverting landscapes to their natural state, with "rewilding" becoming a metaphor for our need to simplify and get back to basics, with Jesus Christ at the heart of everything. God is already renewing the Church, he writes: how can we join in?

Over five weekly sessions, our Mission Development Officer the Revd Robert Bushby (Mission Development Officer) will lead us in discussing the ideas raised in Rewilding the Church two chapters at a time, to consider what this might mean for us in our own churches and settings. The meetings begin at 7.30pm each Wednesday and you can take part in as many or as few of the meetings as you wish. Steve Aisthorpe himself has kindly agreed to join the third meeting, on Wednesday 12 May, to share in our discussion and take our questions.

Tuesday 20 April 7.30-8.30pm



Free for all to attend, this open forum event hosted by the Synod's Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation group (JPIC) will focuses on the timely subject of food poverty. The hour-long meeting takes place via Zoom this coming Tuesday, 20 April at 7.30pm.

The current pandemic has forced ever more households into hardship and in response, many churches have stepped up their support – for example by running, staffing or helping to supply a food bank in their locality. Here is an opportunity to hear from church members who have

responded creatively to the food poverty around them, to compare notes between the situations of different churches – and to consider together whether needs may change as the pandemic eases and restrictions on work and movement are gradually lifted. What might God be calling us to do in this next phase?

A challenge on behalf of JPIC

Then God said, Behold, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is on the surface of the earth, and every tree yielding seed: it shall be food for you . . . I have given every green plant for food: and it was so.'

One of our most pleasant duties as humans is to enjoy 'Nature'. We are part of God's wonderful Creation, so spending time caring for plants and animals (including protecting wild spaces for them) is healing for our bodies, our emotions and our souls. Never feel guilty about time spent walking the hills (now that Covid restrictions are being relaxed) or tending flowers on the windowsill!

Sadly, much of Creation, including much of humanity, is under stress. One reason, which we do not like facing up to, is that vast areas (often stolen from rainforests) grow plants to feed meat and dairy animals. But let's be positive: God, in God's mercy, has inspired scientists and technologists to produce meat-alternatives that are tasty and nutritional. Let's celebrate that on **Earth Day** (and as often as you like!).



Simplest is 'Quorn and two veg' (but check that the Quorn product does not include egg-white). Or select from the vegan cabinet in the supermarket. To be a little more adventurous, substitute Quorn or TVP 'mince' for meat in your favourite cottage-pie or bolognaise (I just add lightly fried onion, TetraPak tomatoes and flavouring). You may need to visit a health-food shop for the TVP – but as a bonus it should be cheaper than meat. Or, if you would really like to push the boat out and do not already possess a vegan cookbook, there are many simple vegan recipes online.

A grace: Bountiful Creator, thank you for your wonderful variety of plants and for the ingenuity of people in developing and preparing them. May this food nourish our bodies and your Word nourish our souls. Amen.

The **Revd Michael Forster**, one of our retired East Midlands Synod ministers and a member at Loughborough URC, generously offers the following hymn words set to the tune Kingsfold (which may be found at *Rejoice & Sing* no 201).

Michael originally wrote this hymn for a 1998 service at Leicester Cathedral, celebrating the 50th anniversary of the NHS, but has reworked and expanded it with a new passage (verse 3) to give thanks not only for those in healthcare but for all key workers.

O God who longs to make us whole in body, spirit, mind, we praise you for the hopes and dreams you share with humankind: for those in pow'r whom you inspired to share the nation's wealth, that rich and poor alike might know security and health.

for those in countless walks of life who daily work and strive to keep each other safe and well, and help the weak to thrive; for those who go beyond the call in myriad other ways, and keep alive the light of hope in dark and cheerless days.

O give us grace to trust your love when hope remains concealed, to watch and pray beside the ones who are not swiftly healed.

And grant us faith, when death itself provides its own release, to trust in your undying love to give them perfect peace.

Give us, O God, your loving zeal to comfort, heal and save, to care for one another 'from the cradle to the grave'.

Then north to south, and east to west, let love and hope extend, until the universe is whole and justice knows no end.


Around the East Midlands

The Revd Lythan Nevard has been nominated to be the next Moderator of Eastern Synod.

Lythan was a member of the URC's Ginger Group in the 1980s, a group of young people that visited churches around the country and led a variety of church related projects, based at Yardley Hastings here in the East Midlands Synod. She has served as a minister in Hartlepool, Romford, Brixham and Babbacombe, and most recently at the Cornerstone ecumenical project in Cranbrook, Exeter.

Lythan said: "The Holy Spirit has led me on many adventures, and I am both delighted and awed that the next one is as Moderator of Eastern Synod. I'm really looking forward to working with the churches and Ministers of the Synod and finding out how we can grow in discipleship and serve God's kingdom together."

Formerly of our own Synod, the **Revd Dr William McGuigan**, known as Bill, died on Sunday 5 December 2020 in the United States of America. Bill served at Toller URC, Kettering (1965-75) and Friary URC, West Bridgford (1975-c.1980) before becoming pastor at Calvary Presbyterian Church in Riverside, California.
