Opening Reflection by the Revd Sarah Gower

Convenor of the Children and Youth group



How was **Shrove Tuesday**? Did you have pancakes, and what fillings did you have? For the first time in many years, I will enjoy pancakes with my husband, who is often away on a school trip at this time of year, and if the beginning of Lent and half term do not coincide, then he is at a traditional Shrove Tuesday Dinner at the school where he teaches with alumni from the last fifty years or so. So, one thing that these strange times have allowed us to do, is to share Shrove Tuesday together.

And so begins **Lent**. A time for reflection about ourselves before God, and a time to reflect on all that God has done for us. Perhaps, like me, you are entering this season rather differently this year. Often the discussion is around what we are going to give up – whether it is something we have always wanted to give up, or feel that we should give up! In recent years, I have heard people talking more about the things they are going to take on; how we are going to use our time differently by doing or being or contemplating or helping. Of course, all of these things are good, especially if they help us to focus a little more on our amazing God.

As I thought about this year, what struck me particularly was that whatever we do should lead us to look to **the God of hope**. Last year, in the middle of Lent, we began to find ourselves in lockdown; a year later, long after we expected, we are still in lockdown albeit, for most of us, a different one. Perhaps we find ourselves struggling just a little bit more than we were, and I am aware that may be a massive under- or overstatement for us all. But how can we use this Lent to help us in these continuingly unprecedented times? How will we use this Lent to focus especially on our God of hope; and how we might spend Lent a little differently?

What is going to point us towards our God, who is our hope yesterday, today and tomorrow – our God who has not changed from before the beginning of time and for eternity; our God who helped the Israelites in their journey through the wilderness, our God who was alongside David, the shepherd boy, as he fought Goliath, as he escaped from Saul, and as he embarked on his journey with God, as the person who was to become the most celebrated king of God's people, despite and because of his failures? In all things, David looked, or eventually looked towards our God of hope.

Then Jesus came, to bring the message of Good News, of God's love, peace, joy and hope, so all the world could live in hope. Let us take time this Lent to look to, to ponder on, and to share our amazing God of hope with one another, with our communities, even if we have to do this differently, and within ourselves.

Have a great and a Godly hope-filled Lent, everybody.

Give Thanks for the Coronavirus Vaccine



On behalf of the JPIC group, Charles Jolly makes the following appeal:

Many of us aged over 70 have now received a Covid-19 injection and we probably feel very relieved and very thankful. Yet the harsh truth is that the rich countries have bought up the bulk of the supplies and, despite some warm words, protecting the vulnerable in poor countries is lagging far behind. Many people that I have spoken with would like to **donate the cost of their vaccine** to help poorer people, in the Christian spirit of sharing.

It is very difficult to give a monetary cost of a Covid jab. Prices paid vary wildly around the world but The Week (22 January) gives the probable cost to the UK of the Pfizer/BioNTech vaccine (which I received) as £15 per person and of the Moderna jab as around £26. But then there is the cost to the NHS of distributing and giving the jabs and there is the considerable sum granted to pharmaceutical companies to aid the rapid development of vaccines. So, as so often, it comes down to a matter of what we can afford.

Unicef has an ambitious plan to deliver 2 billion Covid vaccines to health workers and the most vulnerable across the world. Knowing Unicef they will probably source the vaccines at a lower cost than the UK, EU, Israel and USA, so donating the cost of our jab, if and when we get it, will probably help several vulnerable people. Alternatively, of course, you might consider **Christian Aid** who are working hard to help many poor people to survive the pandemic although they do not have a vaccination programme as such.

News from our fellowship: Abbots Road URC



As we entered 2021, we took time to reflect over the last year and gave thanks for all the blessings we had encountered. With Leicester having been in some degree of lockdown since March 2020, we quickly realised as a church that we needed to be creative in order to continue to 'be church'.

Zoom has been such a lifeline for us. Our Saturday Coffee Mornings continue to thrive and at Christmas we were able to send another donation to **Rainbows Hospice** in Leicester, our designated charity for the year. A total of £1700 was raised from March to December by many of our congregation who gather for a raffle and chat on a Saturday morning and also a quiz night on a Wednesday. But others who don't join us on Zoom also contribute weekly and this great amount was testament to people's generosity. Our designated charity this year is **Homelessness in Leicester**.

We continued to dress the church windows over Christmas so the community could see that although the church building is closed, the church is very much alive. The nativity scene was placed, the lights of the tree shone each night and pictures of the stable, shepherds and Kings were painted by the children.

In addition to our Christmas services on zoom which included a Nativity service with a puppet nativity, Carols by Candlelight, Midnight Communion on Christmas Eve and a family Service on Christmas Day, we also held a 'Drive in' Christmas on the carpark. We welcomed around 15 cars and over 50 people who sang carols together from their cars and on the car park at a distance. This was a wonderful act of worship and witness in our community.





And so we entered into 2021 with Hope in our hearts. We continue to be in lockdown but we remain very active. Our windows are now full of Hope and after the success of the **URC Advent boxes** which we were able to give to our

children and young people, we now enter this time of Lent and we have delivered the URC 'Walking Towards Easter Together' resource pack to each member of our congregation near and far and each family who worship at Messy Church. These have been wonderfully received and we look forward to journeying together and having a time of reflection each Thursday as we approach Easter.

Feeding the 5,000

The **Waste Not Want Not** food bank run by **Buxton URC** has now reached **5,000 food parcels** given out – in a response to food poverty that responds to Jesus's own actions for the hungry in the Gospel.



The **Revd Dr Mark Houghton** says, "The sanctuary and vestry at Buxton has been full with food for those who need it for months now and this surely expresses more of an offering to God than a few songs there of a Sunday in days past."

A team of dedicated volunteers opens the church from 11.00am to 1.00pm six days a week, providing a selection of fresh fruit and vegetables, bread and cakes, tins and packet goods, baby supplies and more for all in need of food support. The food is collected and distributed in conjunction with the FareShare scheme, which provides a means for supermarkets and other outlets to donate surplus food to charities providing food or meals for those in need.

Is Thomas Becket still an inspiration for churches today?



New from the URC: Black History Monthly

It's too important to leave till October. So the URC's Legacies of Slavery Task Group has launched a new monthly opportunity to take a dip into Black History, every month in 2021.



Black History is so important to our shared story that it can't be confined to one month a year: we need to break out and make it something we keep learning about and exploring. Hence **URC Black History Monthly**: a one-hour conversation taking place on the third Monday of every month at 7.30pm on Zoom.

Each month identifies a particular nugget or sweeping overview of Black History which participants are encouraged to review for themselves, before coming together on Zoom to share an hour's discussion, exploring and teasing out how it affects all of us in our situations and settings today.

The next session is on **Monday 15 March** at 7.30pm, focusing on the **Kairos Document** of 1985/86, a key church document from the freedom struggle in South Africa with a rich afterlife in other freedom struggles. What is its resonance in the UK today? The document will be available to read on the URC website in advance of the session.

A **free online course** has been developed by **Public Health England**, based on international guidance from the World Health Organisation, United Nations and partners:
