A time for remembrance and a time for healing



We are in the season of remembrance with **All Saints Day**, **All Souls Day** and then **Remembrance Sunday**, days when we are encouraged to remember those saints we have known as well as all those who have sacrificed their lives in war. It is important to remember, not only to learn the lessons of the past and to honour those who lost their lives in war, but also to help us shape the future of our world, particularly in the light of the urgent challenges that have emerged through **COP26**.

And yet, as we survey God's world, we see nations torn apart by strife, long drawn-out conflicts that scarcely receive mention any more as others hit the headlines, people dying from starvation and malnutrition because of war and the effects of climate change, and at the same time nations developing bigger and better and more sophisticated weapons capable of destroying our planet many times over. In the face of such challenges it is easy to become despondent, to believe there is little that we can do, to feel that God's call to us to be peacemakers is beyond our capacity, and yet the message from the Bible and indeed from our lives is that through our actions, with God's help, we can make a difference. For we believe in a God of love, a God who walks beside us in times of trouble when we are at our weakest, a God who sustains us at times when hope has all but gone.

The prophets of old knew that feeling all too well. **Isaiah**, in his apocalyptic vision (chapters 24 to 27), predicted the sort of judgements and devastation with which we have become familiar with the earth utterly laid waste and utterly despoiled, dried up and polluted and a curse devouring the earth. And yet in these same chapters is the picture of His chosen people praising God while everything around them crashes

to ruins, for the believer can see the hand of God in what seems nothing but tragedy to others. As we remember during this week, we will be aware that for some, in the devastation of war, death and destruction, there will remain a sense of God's presence, while for others there will be nothing but a sense of abandonment.

Christ tells us: "You shall love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you, so that you may be children of your Father in heaven." For many of us, this command is so difficult. But, as we remember stories from our past, we will all be able to recall examples of how, even in war, love can be stronger than hate.

On the night of 14 November 1940, as some in our community will still remember, **Coventry** and its Cathedral endured a one-off, but relentless, bombing campaign. Overnight, the 'Moonlight Sonata' offensive destroyed much of central Coventry, killing hundreds of its people and leaving its Cathedral in ruins. Only the outer shell of the walls and the tower remained standing.

In the days that followed, two enduring symbols emerged from the rubble: two charred roof-beams which had fallen in the shape of a cross were bound and placed at the site of the ruined altar, and three medieval roof nails were also formed into a cross, which became the original Cross of Nails (now located at the High Altar in the new Cathedral). Shortly after, the words 'Father Forgive' – deliberately neutral in content – were inscribed on the wall of the ruined chancel, and **Provost Dick Howard** made a commitment not to seek revenge, but to strive for forgiveness and reconciliation with those responsible. Many protested that Dick Howard should have written "Father, forgive them"; but he was clear, we are all in need of forgiveness and only Jesus can forgive sins. During the BBC radio broadcast from the Cathedral ruins on Christmas Day 1940 he declared that when the war was over we should work with those who had been enemies 'to build a kinder, more Christ-like world.' And that is indeed what happened.

At times of division, when people might expect some form of condemnation, it takes courage to stand up and preach a message of peace and reconciliation, but that was something that Provost Howard had done at a time when no one wanted to forgive Hitler's Germany. His message was clear; we Christians say no to revenge. And he didn't just say it; straight after the end of the war he travelled to Hamburg where 40,000 people had been killed by allied bombers and asked, "How can we help you?"

At this time of remembrance, when parts of God's world still suffer the devastating effects of war, when there is so much conflict and division, when so many are experiencing malnutrition and starvation, and when the very earth groans before the threat of climate change, this may be a time when we all need to seek reconciliation with our neighbours across the world and with the very earth itself, to bring understanding where there is conflict and healing where there is suffering and pain - to build a kinder, more Christ-like world.

To aid our reflections, I would like to leave you with the **Coventry Litany of Reconciliation**:

All have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God.

The hatred which divides nation from nation, race from race, class from class, **FATHER FORGIVE**The covetous desires of people and nations to possess what is not their own, **FATHER FORGIVE**The greed which exploits the work of human hands and lays waste the earth, **FATHER FORGIVE**Our envy of the welfare and happiness of others, **FATHER FORGIVE**Our indifference to the plight of the imprisoned, the homeless, the refugee, **FATHER FORGIVE**

The lust which dishonours the bodies of men, women and children, **FATHER FORGIVE**The pride which leads us to trust in ourselves and not in God, **FATHER FORGIVE**Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you.

Annual Church (ACR) and Safeguarding Returns (ASR)

Important change for Church Secretaries and Safeguarding Co-ordinators to note

This year, the URC plans to introduce **online** Annual Church and Safeguarding Returns.

Churches will be able to submit their statistics and updated information by entering this directly onto the user-friendly **URC Church Update** portal. This will be open to receive updated ACR and ASR data from churches during January and February 2022.

The information supplied from **Annual Church Returns** will be sent electronically to Church House and this will be shared with the Synod. The information supplied from **Annual Safeguarding Returns** will be shared with the Synod Safeguarding Officer. Churches will be contacted with further information about the portal and will each receive an individual login and password in due course.

Greening The Dales

While the **COP26** climate talks have thrown a focus on climate change on a global scale, members at **The Dales United Reformed Church** are amongst those taking action to protect and enhance the environment at a local level.

The church recently hosted a talk by **Lesley Taylor**, the Recycling and Education Officer for **Veolia**. Veolia specialises in waste, carbon and energy management and holds the contract for recycling household waste in Nottinghamshire and elsewhere. Entitled "Talking Rubbish" and taking place aptly in the same week talks began in Glasgow, the talk captivated and challenged church members.

Church Secretary **Janet Clarkson** warmly recommends that other churches, schools and youth groups in the area invite Lesley to give a talk:

"Firstly, it is free. Secondly, it is spellbinding! Lesley is a dynamic speaker: it was a joy to listen to her. We all pride ourselves on being good recyclers, but we certainly found out we were not as good as we thought."

Veolia offer this service in the areas in which they operate, and also (subject to Covid restrictions) arrange community visits to the Materials Recovery Facility in Mansfield, where recyclable materials collected from households are sorted into different types (e.g. plastics, cardboard, paper, metal) and sent on to be used in creating new products. 
