Opening Reflection by the Revd Geoffrey Clarkes Moderator of the East Midlands Synod

Merry Christmas?

In common with other much-used phrases it is possible that when we wish others a "Merry Christmas" we can overlook how those words can sound to those for whom "being merry" feels an experience out of reach for them. Ralph Blane and Hugh Martin's classic seasonal song makes it all sound much simpler than it can feel in reality:

Have yourself a merry little Christmas Let your heart be light From now on Your troubles will be out of sight

Light hearts, troubles out of sight or miles away... faithful friends near to us... Such – and more – are the features of the fantasy land that the "magic" of Christmas enables us to be transported to. Whilst I concede that Christmas gives us licence for a reprieve from the knocks and blows of real life, the chance to convey to others our appreciation of them and to be given permission for a much-needed break from routine, we cannot be blind to the fact that our merriment can accentuate the anguish and suffering of those who feel they cannot muster a sense of joy or celebration. **Thom M Shuman**, in the liturgy he has written for our livestreamed evening prayers for Tuesdays in Advent, touches on this:

... those for whom this season is not one of joy; those whose lives are empty of family and friends.



For such as these the prospect of having a "Merry Christmas" is but a distant dream beyond the current nightmares they endure.

Mary Christmas ...?

I'm drawn, instead, to rediscover something of a "Mary Christmas". "Mary Christmas" and "Merry Christmas" may sound very similar phonetically but the former is found not so much in the tinsel and glitter of light-hearts and troubles far away but is made real in the stress and strain, the grit and grime. A "Mary Christmas" is a daily diet of faith rather than an annual binge on fantasy. It is a faith and lifestyle which embrace a willingness to say "yes" to God even when doing so is accompanied by discomfort and scorn, together with the risk of losing face and favour with others.

A "Mary Christmas" may feature its heartwarming moments of pondering treasured words and the glow of new life (cp. Luke 2:19) but is also open to the reality of soul-piercing grief (cp. Luke 2:35). A "Mary Christmas" invites us, with her, to be God-bearers – the company of those whose words and ways enable others to catch a glimpse of God in our midst. A "Mary Christmas" invites us, with her, to labour for the coming of God's kingdom in a world where there is no place in the inn (cp. Luke 2:7).

In his book, The Humble Church, Martyn Percy, Dean of Christ Church, Oxford writes:

Social distance between God and humanity is abolished in the incarnation. God is with us. ... Our calling as Christ's followers is not to be fretful and fearful, but rather to become an extension of God's courageous, endlessly expended love for the world. ... Our calling is to express the continual love and risk revealed in the incarnation; to become like Jesus, who is the body language of God.

So, I dare to wish you a "Mary Christmas" – confident that a peace and joy beyond price are found in the One she bore at Bethlehem.

I commend Thom M Shuman's prayer:

See, You come, Clarifier of our hearts, playing salvation's love song on a baritone sax; preparing the way for grace to transform our souls; holding us in Your heart when we lose our way.

See, You come, Tender Mercy,
filling in poverty's potholes
with grace's riches;
tearing down cruelty-capped
oppression;
straightening out the winding paths
we make the needy walk;
soothing the lonely nights
of rough sleepers.

See, You come, Eyes of grace,
so in seeing the suffering around us,
we might share mercy;
in observing the struggles of others,
we might give offerings of justice;
in noticing the silence of leaders,
we would cry out for hope.

See, You come, God in Community, Holy in One, so we might be Your people of grace and justice. Amen.



Omicron: Updated Advice from Synod Moderators



Responding to concern about the new Omicron variant of Covid-19 and the government's renewed advice to wear face coverings in enclosed spaces like buses, trains and shops, the United Reformed Church's Synod Moderators published updated advice to churches on Wednesday 1 December, including the following recommendation:

Most of us spend much less time in a single shop than we do in Sunday worship, and the risks of transmission, even with other mitigations properly in effect and the high level of vaccination, are greater in churches than in many other enclosed settings where our members would typically find themselves.


The Synod Moderators agree that as a continuing act of respect and love for neighbour, people using URC buildings in England should also wear face coverings, unless they are medically exempt. ... Please redouble your efforts to see that masks fit well and cover the mouth and nose properly at all times, unless you are taking part in leading worship and are properly physically distanced from others.



Here in the East Midlands Synod we are saddened to announce the death of the **Revd Vernon Broomfield-Payne**, who died on Thursday 18 November after a period of illness. His ministries were in: the Kettering Group (1995-2000); Christ Church, Haydock (2001-10); and Haresfinch (2002-10). A celebration of life service for Vernon was held on Friday 3 December at Nene Valley Crematorium, Wellingborough. Please hold Vernon's wife Kate and all his family in your prayers.

The South Western Synod informs us of the death of the **Revd John McMinn**, who died on Monday 6 December, 25 years after retiring to Yetminster. 

Urgent Appeal from the Winter Night Shelter MK

Our friends at Winter Night Shelter MK write:

"There is an urgent need for more volunteers to come forward in order for us to be able to open the night shelter next month (click here). For the first time ever we are in a situation where we have a waiting list that exceeds every available bed space, due to rising levels of need, and not enough volunteers in place to be able to open our doors yet.



If you are in a position to give a few hours on a regular basis this winter to join one of our friendly and committed teams, this is the time to sign up. We have daily volunteer opportunities available in our evening reception café (at Unity Park Station in central Milton Keynes), in the overnight venues (in Wolverton, Bletchley, Coffee Hall and Newport Pagnell) and in the morning welcome service (at Unity Park Station). Roles include setting up and making beds, meet and greeting, drinks preparation, cooking and kitchen help, food service, night duty, cleaning, packing down, laundry and more.

We understand that many people are rightly cautious about Covid. Through 2020 and 2021 we have been able to continue face-to-face work with guests by ensuring we closely manage our Covid 19 transmission risks. Over the last year we have worked closely with the local public health team and we have put in place a number of measures that are much more rigorous than the general guidance in place across the UK (see the information on our website for more details). We believe these measures will be important to ensure we can continue to be there for all of our guests this season, who need emergency accommodation during the coldest months of the year.

If you are not in a position to volunteer with us we would ask that you consider making a donation to support our work to provide a safe haven for the homeless during the coldest months of the year. We are a charity relying on kind donations and fundraising from individuals and organisations in our community. Thank you."
