Opening Reflection by Geoff Milnes

Working His purpose out

I am writing this a few days before the Synod Meeting, when my **Property Officer's Report** will make it known that six churches have closed since Synod last met, and that two of them have been sold, with another two on the market.

Closure of churches brings mixed feelings to many. For some it is a relief, as there have been too few people to take on the tasks required to run the church and the few who have done these things are running out of steam. For others it is an indication of the times we live in, with ageing and depleting congregations. Then there is the effect of the pandemic, meaning that it has not been possible to meet in person for 18 months or more, and some finding it difficult to come back to church for many reasons. Finally, many

realise that their buildings are old and in poor repair and needing expense, and skills which many do not possess.

Closure, however, is not the end. Indeed it can bring many possibilities that would not have been available otherwise. For example, two of the churches that have closed this year have been sold to other denominations which have the skills needed to maintain and improve the buildings and are 'church planting'. Another church is attracting interest from other denominations whose own properties are beyond economic use and need to relocate.







Chapels which have stood as testament to the faith in villages are ripe for conversion to residential use, but will always look like a chapel, a constant reminder of the people of faith who worshipped there over the generations.

Congregations which have reduced over the years can gain fresh impetus by joining with other fellowships, perhaps refreshing their faith in the process, and gaining a new lease of life.

There is also the opportunity that closure brings – to rethink how church works, to build buildings that are not constrained by their layout to be used once a week, but which can be multipurpose buildings which will be a benefit to the communities in which they are set, enabling the Christian faith to be demonstrated to everyone every day and not just to those who attend worship for an hour on Sundays.







Many wonder what is happening to our churches, our congregations, our buildings, and where will it all end? Are we so out of touch with society that we are becoming irrelevant? What is our purpose – how can we show our faith when all around us seems to be failing?

The answer? Have faith! I am reminded of the words to Arthur Campbell Ainger's hymn – 'God is working His purpose out as year succeeds to year'. He has His plans for us and will not fail us. As He said in Jeremiah at ch 29 v 11: 'For I know the plans I have for you, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future'. Words to trust and rely on.

The future may look uncertain for us, but in prayer and faith we will discern the Lord's plans for all of us and our churches and our fellowships and then, through us, God can indeed work His purpose out, as year succeeds to year.

East Midlands Synod Meeting

The **99**th **Meeting of the East Midlands Synod** was held on **Saturday 9 October**, hosted by **Sherwood United Reformed Church**, Nottingham. Welcoming members of Synod to Sherwood, **Stefan Janiszewski** outlined the adaptations the church had made over the years in order to continue providing relevant service in the local community.

Deputy Synod Moderator the Revd Jane Wade led Opening Worship, describing the Golden Commandment and the Great Commission as two sides of the mission in which God invites us to join. Although, like Jesus' disciples, we might sometimes feel overwhelmed by the task, she suggested that we have already been given all that we require to "gossip the gospel" and transform society.



Synod Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** welcomed several ministers coming into our Synod and marked the Jubilee of the **Revd Anthony James Lawford Jones**, celebrating 50 years of service to the Lord following his ordination in 1971. He led the Synod in remembrance for those ministers and office bearers who had died since our last Meeting and in prayers of thanksgiving for the life and witness of the four churches whose closure was listed in the Book of Reports – **Lutterworth URC**, **Westcotes URC**, the **Headlands Church** and **Badby URC** – alongside two others whose closure had been announced since its publication: **Anstey URC** and **Paulerspury URC**.



A joyous note was sounded as the Moderator presented Maggie Kirkbride with a certificate marking the successful completion of her training to become an Assembly Accredited Lay Preacher. Maggie is the last in this Synod to train as an AALP under the long-standing TLS (Training for Learning and Serving) route, in which not even a global pandemic could deter

The Synod Meeting was joined on Zoom by **Karen Campbell**, the URC's Secretary for Global and Intercultural Ministries, who described the work of the **Legacies of Slavery** task group and urged churches to take part in its consultation, as it shapes the recommendations it will bring to next year's General

Assembly. Karen described how the group had already uncovered several notable cases of antecedents even in the dissenting churches who were apologists for the Transatlantic Slave Trade or plantation owners themselves. Lasting inequalities pervade British society as a result of this often unacknowledged history,

with the varying degrees to which Covid-19 has impacted different communities being one illustration among many. A fascinating and respectful discussion followed on the topics of apology and reparation which, we heard, mirrored the debates that the task group had undergone itself. Karen closed by encouraging us all to continue the conversation and to report our feedback to the task group. (See article below.)



Synod Treasurer **David Greatorex** gave a sensitive presentation of our Synod's role in the "URC family solution" to address the deficit which has arisen in the **Ministers' Pension Trust Fund**. Synod Council had brought a carefully considered recommendation before Synod, specifying the contributions that it might instruct the directors of the East Midlands Synod Trust to make over the next three years to safeguard the pensions of ministers and CRCWs. The resolution was passed unanimously.

Following lunch, the **Revd Michael Forster**, addressing Synod via Zoom, shared the benefit of his professional experience as a counsellor in a succinct and encouraging talk about the other-centred



approach that underpins all good pastoral care. Titling it "Finding the Right Words", Michael advocated that the right words may often be no words at all, or at most some sensitive prompts. The discipline of empathy and the sheer power of presence – just "being there" - almost always outweigh any advice we might be tempted to offer. (For more on "Being There" see the article below.)

Synod Clerk the **Revd Camilla Veitch** gave a brief report of the proceedings of this year's General Assembly, and for the first time in person, followed this with her **Clerk's Report**, which culminated in the presentation of several significant appointments all of which were ratified by members. Group reports followed, with that of the **JPIC** group prompting interesting discussion of the challenges posed to Synod by its policy to become carbon-neutral by 2030. There were encouraging signs that gradually, further churches are signing up to the free Eco Church scheme but much work remains to be done, around Synod and at its centre. In his report, meanwhile, Property Officer **Geoff Milnes** paid tribute to his late predecessor **Robert White**, whom he had hoped to thank in person at this meeting: our gratitude was recorded nonetheless.

In his Closing Worship, our Moderator the **Revd Geoffrey Clarke** introduced the hymn "O God, your love's undying flame" (*Rejoice and Sing* 327) by the late **Revd Basil Bridge**, the bulk of whose ministry was conducted in this Synod. Waterlogged wood though we might presently be, he prayed that our faith might be rekindled so that we may bring warmth to a cold world, light in the darkness and inspiration in situations of hopelessness. Turning to 1 Corinthians 12:12-26, Geoffrey connected the interdependence of every part in the body of Christ with his recent and reluctant adoption of varifocals. In the church too there could be conflict between close-up vision, focused on the local setting and present moment, and long-sighted vision, concerned with the wider Church and planning for its future or (as with the Legacies of Slavery project) interrogating its past. In truth, both types of vision are needed, acting in concert: connectedness for the good of all.

After almost two years of distance and enforced separation, this was a joyous occasion in which many members revelled in greeting one another in person and raising their voices in praise as the corporate body of Christ in this particular setting. We now look forward with optimism and refreshed vision to our 100th Synod Meeting in March 2022 and to celebrating the URC's Jubilee when we come together again next autumn.

Legacies of Slavery - new video and consultation



Being There: book offer

At the Synod Meeting on Saturday 9 October, members heard an inspiring presentation by the **Revd Michael Forster** on the subject of "Finding the right words", outlining the principles of empathy, presence and attentive listening that characterise good pastoral care. Michael's book **Being There: The Healing Power of Presence** explores these themes in further depth, drawing on his complementary insights as both trained counsellor and URC minister. As well as distilling the key disciplines of an effective pastoral companion, **Being There** uses the lens of therapeutic practice to cast fascinating new light on familiar Bible stories — and Bible stories to illuminate critical aspects of pastoral relationships.


UN CLIMATE Change Conference UK 2021



Abington Avenue URC's Eco Journey

In our last issue we congratulated **Abington Avenue URC**, Northampton, on becoming the latest church in our Synod to be awarded an <u>Eco Church</u> award. **Rachel Jones** shares details of how the church achieved this milestone:

Our journey towards the **Eco Church bronze award**, which we were delighted to receive recently, began long before we had heard of <u>A Rocha</u> and Eco Church. When our church buildings were redeveloped 25 years ago, environmental concerns





were already provided, as were cycle racks.

As the threats to our environment became more apparent, the church agreed to the setting up of a small 'Eco Group', tasked with looking at ways in which as a congregation and as individuals we could do more. The obvious starting point was the Eco Church <u>survey</u>, accessed via A Rocha's <u>website</u>. This proved to be an excellent tool for assessing our impact on the environment and considering what more we could realistically do in both the long and the short term. The website also provides numerous useful links to advice on greener living and prayer and worship resources.

Many measures were easy to implement: encouraging users of the building to bring in crisp packets for us to take in bulk to a local collection point for recycling, collecting old

spectacles to send to Vision Aid, providing a container for used batteries and taking compostable kitchen waste home, rather than putting it down the waste disposal.

As far back as 2008 we acquired an allotment, where we grow organic produce to use in the church kitchen and to donate to a shelter for homeless people. We have recently put up homemade nesting boxes and created a frogfriendly wildlife pond with an adjacent log pile. Flowers such as borage and nasturtiums are sown alongside vegetable to deter pests and attract pollinating insects. Compost from our three containers and leaf mould from a wire cage are vitally important soil conditioners, as is green manure, sown as the beds become vacant and dug in before they flower. Part of the plot is deliberately



left untidy (this is not at all difficult!) with long grass and weeds/wildflowers allowed to flourish.

We wanted to engage the local community as well as the church congregation in our drive to be more environmentally friendly. To this end we organised a **litter pick** in the streets surrounding the church early in 2020, hosting volunteers to a soup lunch afterwards. On the same day a local councillor ceremonially

planted a rowan tree in front of the church.



The news that we had qualified for a bronze award arrived with perfect timing just before our recent, very successful Community Eco Event. Representatives of local and national environmental organisations came to showcase their activities and give information and advice about how to live more sustainably. People were also encouraged to join campaigns about the climate emergency and sign postcards to send to the Prime Minister. Templates on the Christian Aid website were used to make a flotilla of prayer boats ready to send to Glasgow prior to Cop26, and to create a 'Wave of Hope' display for our church windows. Pre-loved books and toys were on offer, a local wholefood cooperative sold fairly traded foodstuffs, delicious vegan food was available from a van outside, and a considerable amount of donated cake was consumed. Throughout the event there was a real buzz, and an encouraging sense of common purpose as Christians and non- Christians realised we all shared the same concerns and the same determination to work together to bring about change.

We are now aiming to progress towards a silver award over the coming year. In order to achieve this, we will need to engage more actively in local and national campaigning on environmental issues and find ways to challenge people to make further lifestyle changes that will benefit the planet. We may also find ourselves organising another Eco event!

Advent and Christmas videos from URC Daily Devotions

A new resource to help with Pulpit Supply

The **Revd Andy Braunston**, who developed the URC's popular **Daily Devotions**, is introducing a new resource as an aid to churches who have Audio-Visual technology in place.

Running as a trial in the first instance over Advent and Christmas, the **introductions, sermons and blessings** from the Daily Devotions **Sunday Service** will be available ahead of time in video format. This responds to increasing demand from churches to use the Sunday Service for pulpit supply purposes, either because they have had difficulty securing someone to preach on a given Sunday, or because their worship teams are happy to put a service together but cautious about developing a sermon.

This will permit more flexible use of the Sunday Service, which until now has been provided as a more "radio"-like experience in a continuous audio stream. The Service will now be available, ahead of time, as a Powerpoint file with the video sections embedded, and might be used in a number of ways:

- the congregation could use all the service on the screen and sing along to the hymns the words will be in the Powerpoint. All that is needed is someone to set up the technology before the service and advance to the next slide when needed.
- An elder could lead the prayers and play the Powerpoint for hymns, introduction, blessing and/or sermon. Someone authorised by the Synod could preside at a celebration of Holy Communion.
- An elder could do as described above and the local musician play for hymns or other hymns could be substituted than those chosen for the service.


Religious Persecution Today – a Study Day
