Opening Reflection by Mr Ron Kenyon Chair of the East Midlands Synod Trust

I suppose most of you reading this suffer from junk mail although after 12 months with hardly any, I suddenly find myself having to remove some 40 per week with a few of them coming through in triplicate.

They try all sorts of methods these days to make me think that the computerised junk mail is especially for me – 'Mr Kenyon, you have been chosen to...' – and despite our disparagement this type of mailing can work. Why? Because in a limited way, it appeals to a need in all of us... to feel special.

Blinded by tears, Mary doesn't recognise Jesus. It is only when she hears Jesus speak her name that she knows who it is. Several years later a devout Pharisee, caught up in a rage at the church as it grew across the Roman empire, was to fall to the ground in fear at the sound of his own name: 'Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting me..?'

From the moment Mary and Saul heard their names spoken their lives would never be the same. Mary would proclaim the resurrection until her dying day. Saul would become the great church builder and pastor.

We may well have heard our name called. It may have been a commission from God which has been neglected for years. But be certain -- it was no junk mail delivery. We, and only we, have been chosen, for that task.

Brigstock United Reformed Church Help for Ukraine

Living in a village made it difficult for some people to take goods for the Ukraine appeal to the town collection points, so we decided to open the chapel for two hours one Saturday, and an hour in the week to coincide with school pick-up times and offered to take the goods ourselves to the collection points. Volunteers, not all connected with the chapel, came and helped us sort out the amazing number of donations we received in that short time, mostly toiletries, medical and sanitary supplies and baby wipes, nappies and bedding.



A month ago, 13 Ukrainian lorry drivers were stranded on the A14 near Rothwell because they couldn't get fuel to return home. Local people rallied round and gave them food and shelter, and fuel was provided along with loads of goods collected by people in the surrounding area. Working to a deadline to fill the lorries and get them moving, we were able to send four estate cars full of the goods we collected, and they were all sent out a week ago. We were amazed-but shouldn't have been!- at the generosity of local people. We are keeping an eye on the situation and are ready to collect again once distribution points are made known.

For some years we have held a Lent Lunch of soup, bread and cheese, and invited members of Brigstock St Andrews C of E to join us, with all proceeds going to charity. After two years of not being able to do this, we enjoyed hosting this event again on March 20th, and raised £220 in donations for the DEC Ukraine appeal.





Providing Temporary Accommodation for Ukrainian Refugees

Information from Geoff Milnes, Synod Property Officer

We have had a few enquiries as to Insurers' stance regarding providing temporary accommodation for Ukrainian refugees. I have now had the following response from our main Insurers Congregational and Ansvar which I thought would be useful to share with you.

Ministers taking Ukrainian refugees into their own homes

- All refugees are in the UK legally
- This must be done as part of the Government scheme so all vetting/checks done by them
- Safeguarding measures must be in place to protect the Minister and his/her family and also the refugees
- This is a temporary arrangement
- Premises are suitable for this arrangement
- All risk assessed and appropriate Health & Safety assessments carried out

The Minister should advise his/her contents Insurers.

Use of Unoccupied manses

- Refugees must be in the UK legally
- · Again, this must only be on a temporary basis
- Must be part of the Government scheme so all vetting/checks done by them
- Properties must be suitable/fit for purpose up to date gas/electric etc
- Appropriate risk management assessments done as per any other letting of the property

Other points to note

- We must be made aware of any arrangements made
- Insurers would prefer family units rather than groups of unrelated people

To assist the situation, Insurers do not propose to charge any additional premiums/extra terms. However, we would kindly ask you to refer all arrangements to ourselves at the Synod Office, in the first instance. Email: property@urc5.org.uk Tel: 0115 9609241

UN BIODIVERSITY CONFERENCE

COP 15 - CP/MOP10-NP/MOP4

Ecological Civilization-Building a Shared Future for All Life on Earth

If you have been keeping up with reports from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change since **COP26** you will know that it is 'Now or Never' to save the World (especially the Poor World) from climate chaos. And the fall-out from Putin's horrific war in Ukraine means that we will have to tighten our belts even further (as if they were not tight enough with the fall-out from Covid-19).

So here is something to cheer you up: **COP 15** is about to get underway in China at last (although much may be on-line)! COP15? What on earth is that? I'm glad you asked.

There are two great threats to God's wonderful Creation: **climate change** (mainly because of too much atmospheric carbon dioxide, methane &c) and **biodiversity loss** (numbers of wild creatures tumbling and many species going extinct). Biodiversity loss results from change in land use (more colloquially: land grabs), pollution, over-exploitation and (notoriously) the introduction of foreign species. For a good introduction see: https://royalsociety.org/topics-policy/projects/biodiversity . Needless to say, climate change is making things worse.

Happily, many scientists, not to mention Sir David Attenborough, are on the case. In 1993, the **Convention for Biological Diversity** or CBD was signed by 196 countries (neither the USA nor the Holy See were signatories, although the Encyclical by Pope Francis: 'On Care for Our Common Home' is highly supportive). The three goals are: conservation, sustainable use of biodiversity and equitable sharing of the benefits arising from genetic resources.

Needless to say, most countries fell far short of their targets. Well, a piecemeal approach was never going to work; these are global issues although we can all do our bit locally. Now, with cautious hope, we have the 15th conference of the parties to the convention (COP15). This started on-line last October, gets into its stride in May this year, with final talks at the end of August. At last, there seems a real determination to hammer out a Global Biodiversity Framework.

Two approaches are needed. The first is to protect and restore wilderness (including the oceans). The big agenda (as described by Dr Scott Leatham of the Centre for Alternative Technology) is to protect 30% of the world's land and ocean by 2030 ("30 by 30"). This will give wild populations from angel sharks to zebras an opportunity to recover and countless species a chance to avoid extinction. Even more ambitious is the Earth 50 Plan, which would see half of this World a protected area.

The really big worry about this is that a 'top-down' approach could lead to the eviction of indigenous people, who are in practice often the best guardians of nature. There is a long and murky history here, starting with the eviction of native Americans from Yellowstone Park by the military in 1872. The danger (as with some 'offsetting' schemes) is of 'eco-colonialism' by Northern nations and vested interests. Do you begin to see why it is so important to pray for wisdom for the delegates at COP15?

The second approach, which you will be familiar with if you are an **Eco Church**, is to recognise that we are part of the wilderness – regardless of whether we live in city or country. "We have to learn to live in and within nature" (Dr Leatham, again). What we are talking about is a change in our lifestyle: all the way from eating less meat and boycotting unsustainable palm oil to putting up bug-hotels and avoiding chemicals in our back yards. As with climate change, we need to talk the talk, walk the walk and demand that politicians and industries make the change. Here's some more good news: this is a win-win because many measures to save biodiversity will also help to save the climate.

from Tuesday 24 May at 7.30pm


Dig down deep into what it means to follow Jesus with our latest Synod book group, live on Zoom.

Beginning on 24 May, we will explore **The Radical Disciple** over four successive Tuesday evenings led by the **Revd Matt Rigden**.

Published in 2010, **The Radical Disciple** represents the final word of **John Stott**, one of the UK's most celebrated Christian writers and teachers. In eight short and highly readable chapters, Stott explores eight key aspects of Christian discipleship which deserve to be taken seriously – and challenges us not to pick and choose only those which sound the most appealing.

Matt, who is Community Minister for the Heath Christian Partnership in Lincoln, will lead us in four weekly sessions, exploring two chapters at a time. The sessions will each last around 90 minutes and conclude in a time of prayer.
