Opening Reflection by the Revd George Mwaura Convenor of OMCG (Ordained Ministers & Churches Group)

Happy New Year friends...or is it too late for that? I do not think so!

Christmas and New Year festivities have come and gone. All too soon if you ask me. Now we are in the middle of **Epiphany** where Christ is continuously revealed to us. I hope that you have all received grace upon grace to see you through the coming year with all its trials and blessings... and there will be some without any doubt! If you are reading this, then you are the recipient of such grace so, praise the Lord!

In the western hemisphere churches, we celebrate the season of Epiphany from 6 January through to the Sunday before Ash Wednesday. Epiphany represents the revealing of Jesus to the Jews and Gentiles and its main theme is **Christ as the light of the world**. The revealing that begins with the Magi following the star continues with the baptism by John, calling of the disciples, and ends with the recognition of Jesus in the Temple by Simeon and Anna. In a sense, it is a continuation of the Christmas journey – a time to reflect on the meaning of these events. As we travel the Epiphany route each year, the revelation is remarkably different because each year, as inhabitants of this world we are changed and shaped by the encounter with fellow Christians and the forces of nature that shape our world and over which we have no control.

In the western hemisphere, Epiphany falls at a dark and low time of the year. This is not by mere coincidence. It is during these dark times, made even darker by the pandemic which has ravaged our world for two years without a let up, that we are offered divine grace and mercy from the Godchild now revealed to us. Jesus' arrival into our dark world meant the forgiveness of our sins and a reconciliation with God. Today, God's love embraces all humanity and as Christ is revealed to us, we who once dwelt in the darkness are given light and strength in the power of the Holy Spirit to get us through the year ahead no matter what the pandemic, climate change or any other unknown catastrophe may throw at us.



It is funny how the lectionary time moves so fast. Barely six weeks ago was Jesus born and now he is 30 years old in the narrative and about to embark on his ministry. I just wish real time would move that fast! Anyway, last week we journeyed with him back to his village and we beheld him preach for the first time

with authority. Jesus read from Isaiah 61 and in essence set out his mission. This particular passage is a servant song, and proclaims that the Messiah will bring relief to the disenfranchised. This too is the mission of the church because Jesus calls us as his church to show love to the unloved, and to offer service to all, even those (un)deserving. It is not a comfortable discipleship. As we hear these words from Isaiah, we must remember that poverty, captivity, and blindness have both physical and spiritual dimensions. Hard as it is to struggle materially, it is debilitating to be spiritually bankrupt.

The words from **Isaiah** held a tantalising hope not just for the poor but also for all Jewish people in Palestine. The Roman administration had stationed soldiers throughout its empire to make sure that Roman laws were followed and taxes collected. As colonised people, the Jews had no say in their future. And as far as political power was concerned, we could equally argue that the Jews were poor, captive and oppressed and they, just like those in Isaiah's scroll Jesus read about, desperately needed a saviour.

The prophecy in Isaiah was fulfilled when Christ was born, died and resurrected. But this narrative didn't end there and the fulfilment continues today in the life and mission of our churches. Everywhere you look today, the church of Christ is the messenger of God's Good News to the poor and the oppressed. It proclaims the release of the captives, it helps the blind to recover their sight and it partners with others to set folks free from slavery and addictions and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour through championing human rights, providing relief to victims of natural disasters and domestic abuse, taking the gospel to far flung corners and many, many more. Today the church collaborates with the Holy Spirit to fulfil Christ's mission in the Isaiah passage. We thank our Missional God for inviting us to participate in the **missio Dei**.

Legacies of Slavery – Discussion Evening

Consider how slavery shaped the East Midlands and play your part in the consultation

Monday 7 March 7.30-9.00pm on Zoom



The **East Midlands Synod** has joined forces with the **Legacies of Slavery task group** to host a Discussion Evening, designed to help churches and individuals respond to the current consultation. This is an opportunity to share perspectives, questions and feedback directly with two members of the task group: **Karen Campbell**, Secretary for Global and Intercultural Ministries, and the group's Convenor **Professor David Reynolds**.

Join us to explore:

- How the history of transatlantic slavery resonates in our own region
- The ways its legacy persists in the inequalities of the present day
- What we in the United Reformed Church may be called to do about it now

Taking place via Zoom, the Discussion evening is supported by the Synod's **JPIC** group (Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation).

Since making some painful discoveries about the involvement in the transatlantic slave trade of some of our forebears in faith, the **Legacies of Slavery task group** has shared the draft of an **Apology and Confession** for consideration by General Assembly 2022. Its concise <u>Consultation Document</u> includes recommendations about reparative justice and complements the URC's resolution to become an actively anti-racist church. You can read it at:

Last autumn, the task group launched a consultation across the whole URC to seek responses. **Karen** introduced this at our Synod meeting in October, where there was a clear desire for further discussion. Her

Karen says:

"We want people across the breadth of the URC to have a say, contributing to the recommendations being taken to our jubilee General Assembly. We are offering ourselves – and the URC's racial Justice networks – as a resource to help facilitate local conversations, and to discover how people respond to the direction of travel so far. The task group included widely differing perspectives and conversations were not always easy, but they were open and honest. That is what we want to encourage across the Church. The important thing is not so much where anyone starts or finishes in the conversations, it is the willingness to be on the journey together."

Churches are asked to respond in time to feed into the final version of the task group's recommendations to General Assembly this summer. You are warmly invited to take part in this Discussion Evening which, as well as feeding directly into the consultation process, may also help you in preparing your church's feedback.

Anti-Trafficking & Modern Slavery - Awareness Raising & Volunteer Opportunities

Our friends in the **Salvation Army** have introduced a mentoring programme to supports survivors of modern slavery on their journey from victim to survivor and are seeking volunteers in the Nottingham area.



The Salvation Army has developed a mentoring programme which aims to support people on their journey from victim to survivor. Mentors help to model healthy community with a structured relationship, modelling how to establish goals, giving practical support, advice, signposting and helping to celebrate successes.

The role offers an exciting opportunity to be part of a programme to mentor a female or male survivor of modern slavery as they establish life in Nottingham. Volunteers will work with a fellow mentor to support a client (survivor) to establish goals as well as provide practical guidance and support for the individual to achieve them. This will happen every other week for two hours.

All volunteers will receive specialised training and regular support. If you have a passion for transforming the lives of people, this may be the role for you.



Discipleship Development Fund – New Opportunities

The United Reformed Church has revised its **Discipleship Development Fund** to encourage all individuals, groups and churches to engage with a journey of **deepening personal discipleship**.



There are now two levels: the **Small Grant** scheme awards grants of **up to £200** per person, while the **Large Grant** scheme welcomes applications from churches, groups and Synods for grants of around **£5000**.

You can apply for resources, courses and conferences or help to develop programmes of your own – be creative! At both levels, the Discipleship Development Fund is designed to:

- create opportunities for everyone to **encounter the living God**, whether they already identify themselves as followers of Christ or not
- encourage everyone in their **prayer life and relationship with God** to enable them to live as disciples of Jesus
- encourage everyone to make the most of **educational opportunities** that are relevant and appropriate for them in their discipleship journey.

Small Grant Scheme

- Who can apply? All individuals and congregations in the URC may apply, for up to £200 a year.
- What's it for?An individual could receive support for discipleship courses, activities or retreats. A
congregation might seek help to bring in an outside speaker or buy resources to
facilitate an in-house project or event: there are all sorts of possibilities.
- **Who awards grants?** Each Synod awards the Small Grants, from a pot of **£2000** each year please apply early to avoid disappointment!

Large Grant Scheme

- Who can apply?Any recognised group within the URC is invited to apply, including local churches,
Synods and Assembly Committees.
- What's it for?Grants can be put towards any purpose that will contribute to the discipleship
development of lay people in or connected with the URC including personnel costs,
facilities, travel, courses etc. Multi-year projects can be supported for up to 3 years.
- **Who awards grants?** The Large Grant Awarding Group will meet four times a year. Applications are invited by the end of March, June, September and December and the Group will normally respond with its decision by the end of the following month.

Tuesday 8 February - Prof. Steve Furber (Manchester University): 'Brains, Minds and AI - Implications for Faith and Ethics'


Tuesday 22 February - Prof. Neil Messer (University of Winchester): 'Cognitive Science and Religious Faith'
