Opening Reflection by Revd Sarah Gower Convenor of Children and Youth Development Group

One of the lectionary readings that we had recently was **1 Corinthians 12**. We read it a little differently, and I am not sure if I will ever be able to read it again in church in any other way. We had signs with certain words written on them – like BODY and PARTS and EYE and EAR and HEAD and HAND and FOOT, also things like APOSTLES and PROPHET and TEACHER – and when one of these words was mentioned the person holding the sign stood up or waved their piece of paper and showed the word to everyone. We included as many people as possible, and some decided to respond to their word in pairs. To the two most energetic people in the congregation, I gave the words BODY and PARTS, as it is amazing how many times these words are mentioned, and they had to be fit enough to keep standing and sitting. I think some people thought I had rewritten the Bible passage (which I had not) to include even more examples of these two words. It was great fun. I read the passage slowly. We listened. We participated. And we most definitely laughed. Together, we heard that part of Paul's letter to the Corinthians afresh. We heard it as a group of people together, all bringing something a little different to the reading. And, for a moment or two, we were actively and most definitely engaged in being the body together.

Even as I write about it, I recall the fun and the laughter we had as well as realising some of the truth of what Paul is saying to the Corinthians. As God's people it is best when we work together. It is best when we include all people – children and adults of all ages; girls and boys, women and men; those from our own country and those from abroad, perhaps today's equivalent of Jew and Gentile (and Samaritan, my addition to Paul's letter!); different economic and educational backgrounds. Because all of us have a part to play in God's family and as God's people.



Something we have discovered over this last two years is our need of real-life relationships with other people. I wonder, are you still, like me, enjoying being able to meet other people in person? Church on a Sunday morning is different — we are still a little more spread out, we are still using the extent of our building, everyone is wearing masks, and when we share the Peace, we no longer shake hands but offer a wave of peace to each other instead. But it is still wonderful to see people, not confined to a little box. We have learnt a little more how to appreciate each other, something I hope will continue. As we come together in the presence and family of God — Father, Son and Holy Spirit, we realise how the very nature of God is of welcome and love and belonging.

Each and every one of us is vital to God, we are all vital to each other. Together we are enriched and empowered through God to welcome and love and help others in our churches and communities to belong. And in so doing we are further enriched and blessed together by God's amazing grace and overwhelming love.

May I offer you, my brothers and sisters, a wave of peace, and great fun as together we learn to be the body of Christ.

Coronavirus: Synod Moderators' updated Guidance

Now that governments in England, Scotland and Wales have eased legal restrictions around coronavirus, the Synod Moderators have updated their guidance to churches.

Although regulations have changed, and the current wave of infections is showing signs of easing, infection rates remain high across the United Kingdom. We would therefore urge the continued use of face coverings in churches, including during singing, as well as maintaining good hand hygiene and appropriate physical distancing.

We fully appreciate the high, and rapidly increasing, costs of heating churches, but we remind you of the importance of good ventilation as well to prevent the build-up of virus particles in the atmosphere.

We know the vast majority of people in our buildings will be fully vaccinated, and that vaccination reduces the seriousness of infection. However, it is abundantly clear that the Omicron variant is still making people ill, even amongst those who are vaccinated.

Please continue to care for yourself and others by taking all reasonable measures to reduce the spread of the virus. If you are infected the symptoms may be minor – they could have a much more serious effect on anyone to whom you inadvertently pass the disease.

Around the East Midlands

Christmas Outreach Project at Castle Hill URC



With support from East Midlands Synod's Mission Fund, **Castle Hill URC** in Northampton was able to run an outreach project in December 2021 that welcomed over 400 children from the local primary school and many of the local community.



The church erected a life-size Nativity scene outside the building. All through December, visitors, neighbours and passers-by were invited to come and have their own photographs taken as one of the figures in the stable, which all had cut-out faces to peep through — even the sheep. This was complemented by a Nativity trail around the perimeter of the church.

Meanwhile, school classes and community groups came into the church at scheduled times to learn about Advent, take part in crafts and games, and hear the Christmas story.

Visiting children made a number of enthusiastic comments:

"The Nativity scene was huge. It was such fun pushing my face through the hole."

"This church is awesome. You don't have to sit still!"

"I have had such a good time. I'm going to bring my Mum and sister to see the big Nativity in the dark when it's lit up."



Following the success of 2021's outreach project, Castle Hill URC is already hoping to add the Magi to the scene this coming December.

• **Helen Garton:** Are we where it's at? Why being Radical is not being Radical at all.


• lain McDonald: Hope frustrated and fulfilled - a personal journey.

East Midlands Synod URC Youth Games Day



Church Energy Costs

With the announcement on the **3 February** that the price cap on energy costs is going to increase by 54%, it is vital that churches seek the best contract from electricity and gas providers that is available.

There are a number of agents (some might call them middlemen) who can look at the market and get the best deal going – they get paid by the provider, so it doesn't cost the church anything to do this.

Recently I received an email from a company called **The Utility Management Company** offering this service, and I have had dealings with **Love Energy** when arranging contracts for my own church at Melton Mowbray. There may well be others, so it would pay to have a look around.


With all costs escalating in the coming months, and often not accompanied by a matching increase in income, it is even more important that we continue to give good stewardship to our churches.

On another matter, can I remind churches that they must undertake regular inspections of their Manses and keep them well maintained and in good decorative order. I have had a couple of occasions recently where Ministers have moved out of Manses and a full programme of redecoration, and in one case the replacement of carpets, had to be carried out before the property could be either let or sold! The cost of this was over £1000 in each case, which had to be paid by Synod. If the Manses had been regularly inspected such costs would have been minimised as the defects would have been discovered early and easily dealt with.

It is incumbent upon us all to make sure that our Ministers are able to live in clean, well-presented and maintained houses – after all, it is their home.
