Getting there...

It's the sound of summer. The thwack of willow on leather; the background drone of bumblebees and lawnmowers — and the chorus of "Are we there yet?" from the back seats of a million family car trips.

(My daughter holds the record: once, on a drive to Scotland from our Stapleford home, we stopped to refuel. "Is this Scotland?" she piped up. We had yet to leave Stapleford.)

But in this summer of 2021, "Are we there yet?" takes on a new level of anguish. By now, surely, we all thought we'd have come out the other end of the Covid-19 tunnel and found ourselves on the sunny uplands of the "new normal".



Earlier this week, the Government lifted almost all legal restraints relating to the pandemic. The Press billed it as "Freedom Day". So, are we there yet? Plenty have seized the day as if we were: casting aside face masks, bumping elbows at the bar, thronging back to nightclubs. "If not now, when?" is the new refrain.

True, the light at the end of the tunnel does begin to fill more of the windshield. At the same time, infections are rising, immunisation is far from complete and the WHO and others watch England's experiment with mounting concern. The vulnerable are feeling anything but free. Not to mention the new "pingdemic" of people instructed to self-isolate, leading to understaffed hospitals, cancelled trains, empty classrooms and unemptied bins. Those of us who have planned holiday trips (Yorkshire for me) may or may not get there at all.

What does this mean in our churches? We have been stepping gingerly back into our buildings – but there are still many gaps in the pews and our singing is muted. Like the leaders of other denominations, the URC's Synod Moderators <u>urge us to keep our masks on</u> in loving witness to our fellow worshippers.

Lately, it has felt we still have a long, long way to go in many other aspects of our public life. The inclusive, caring, multicultural nation that the England men's team seemed to model for a few shining weeks of Euro 2020? We're not there yet, not when their defeat (in the final, no less) unleashed a torrent of racial abuse.

The compassionate new global Britain our politicians promised? We're not there yet, not when our parliament has voted to claw back a drop in the ocean of national debt by slashing the aid support it had guaranteed for healthcare, family planning and girls' education in places of dire need.

A bright, green beacon of sustainability, ready to lead the world at the COP26 conference this November? Not when we're still contemplating new coal mines. We've made fine pledges and set targets, but have yet to act on anything like the scale required to meet them. So, are we there yet? I don't think so.

This season of pandemic has been described as our time in the wilderness: our certainties upturned, our plans dashed, our way ahead unclear. Better commentators than I have compared it to the travails of the Children of Israel, wandering the desert a full forty years after their flight from Egypt, the Promised Land postponed by their constant backsliding and back-biting. It is the biggest "Are we there yet?" in the Book.

Moses never does get there, although God permits him a mountaintop glimpse of Canaan before he dies. The Children of Israel attain the Promised Land at last – or their children do – but their arrival is no Happy Ever After: their continued lapses of faith lead to an endless cycle of exile, conquest and return.

If our vision of a Promised Land is no more than a return to life as it was before Covid, the comparison to the Israelites might not be terribly encouraging. But we are their heirs, and I wonder whether as followers of Jesus we can ever expect to be "there yet" in this life. Our call is to grow ever closer in resemblance to Christ, but show me the disciple who believes they've got there and I'll probably show you my heels.

Will we ever get there? Would we even recognise "there" if we did? Whether our focus is on the pandemic, or the whole journey of our lives, I'm convinced that our task is to walk through present darkness with our eyes fixed on the light, trusting that God will illuminate our path in time. A favourite hymn of mine puts it like this:

So every day we're on our way, for we're a travelling, wandering race; we're the people of God.

(Rejoice & Sing 547)

"Getting there": maybe that should be our hope. Ever walking the way of Jesus today. Ever reforming.

Earlier this month I had the honour of representing the East Midlands Synod at my first **General Assembly** (on Zoom, of course). It was a fascinating exercise in waiting upon the movement of the Spirit, discerning together where God wants the URC to go next – the very premise being that we're not there yet.

So the very weekend that a penalty shootout exposed residual racism in our land, General Assembly was attempting to cast the beam out of our own eye: contemplating how to overcome the historic lack of diversity in our leadership and become an actively anti-racist church. Elsewhere, we considered how to extend our ministry in the digital realm; how to respond to Modern Day Slavery; and how best to stand against the exploitation of the occupied Palestinian territories. Meanwhile, a new group has embarked on a Review of Church Life, to look afresh at what the calling of the URC may be in the decades ahead and whether that means reforming our structures and resources. With our 50th jubilee next year, it's a good time to ask where God wishes to lead us.

In the wider world, too, there is cause to walk hopefully this summer. Don't just look at those who have cast coronavirus caution to the winds, but the many others who continue to watch and care for the people around them. Look at the way people have spoken out in support of those inspiring young footballers, or in outrage at the Government's foreign aid reversal. Look at the way <u>young Christians are leading the way</u> on climate change, literally walking from the G7 in Cornwall to COP26 in Glasgow.

We can join in. We can be the ones to speak up for equality, campaign for compassion, march for better stewardship of God's good Earth. And yes, barring medical exemptions, we can keep our masks on a little longer and show our love for our neighbours.

Are we there yet? No. But let's pray that we're getting there – this moment, and always.

General Assembly 2021

Our Synod Clerk the **Revd Camilla Veitch** reports back on the recent meeting of General Assembly:

This took place online over four days, 9-12 July – a tiring but rewarding experience! Here are some of the issues that were discussed/agreed:









- A **Review Group** has been assembled to review the life, structures, resources and work of the URC to equip us better for the future
- A new post for a Minister for Digital Worship was created, one of the responsibilities being to continue to develop the URC's <u>Daily Devotions</u>
- <u>Several resolutions</u> were passed concerning Israel and Palestine, including calls to action for local church members to write to their MPs and to refrain from purchasing products produced in Israeli settlements in the occupied Palestinian territories. Members are also asked to support Palestinian products available in the UK.
- It was agreed in principle that the URC Pension Schemes for Ministers and lay staff would move from Defined Benefit Schemes to alternative, most likely Defined Contribution Schemes
- · A paper was adopted on how to gain recognition as a Locally Recognised Worship Leader
- · A **Disciplinary Process** for [lay] office holders was adopted
- Plans for the 50th Anniversary of the URC were shared, including a competition for hymn/songwriters, poets and rappers to submit entries for the Jubilee celebrations
- · Assembly agreed to the creation of 'URC Children' an umbrella term to cover all work with children in the URC







...and so much more!! Whilst it was tiring being on Zoom for so long it was encouraging to see so many committed Christians from all around the URC family joining together for worship and to debate what it means to live out our faith in today's world. JPIC Forum: Climate Change, Divestment and COP26

An open **Forum** was hosted online on Thursday 15 July by the Synod's **Justice**, **Peace and Integrity of Creation** group (JPIC), with a focus on the climate crisis.



Guest speaker **Adrian Shaw**, the Church of Scotland's Climate Officer until last year, led discussion of climate change and divestment from fossil fuels in conversation with **Tom Veitch**. Adrian also highlighted some ways for churches and individuals to bring pressure to bear ahead of the **COP26** conference in Glasgow in November, while general discussion included ways of supporting the Youth Christian Climate Network's pilgrimage from the site of the G7 meeting in Cornwall to COP26 in Scotland.

Rise to the moment: Support the YCCN Relay

The **Young Christian Climate Network** (YCCN) has embarked on an ambitious relay across the UK to raise the message of climate justice ahead of COP26, carrying with them the sail of the unique boat they have constructed, with its message of "Rise to the Moment".

Supported by **Christian Aid** and many others, the relay kicked off in Cornwall after the G7 Summit in June and is gradually making its way through Great Britain with the aim of reaching Glasgow, the host city of **COP26**, in November. YCCN invite people of **all ages** to get involved – young, old or in between – to help them campaign for systemic change on a local and global scale.

- Offer to accommodate one of the walkers overnight
- Help to get local leaders and media involved
- Plan a "tributary" walk to meet up with the main route

Send your Prayer Boats to COP26



Christian Aid says:

The climate crisis is a storm that is affecting us all, yet we're not all in the same boat! Many of the countries around the world who are most affected by the climate emergency are also the ones least equipped to deal with it. Join with others around the country to pray for the climate crisis and to send a message to politicians that they must prioritise those who are most affected.

HOW TO GET INVOLVED:

- 1. Make your prayer boats using the instructions below or on <u>YouTube</u>. Why not invite your local MP to join you?
- 2. Share images of your boats on Facebook or Twitter with the hashtag **#prayforCOP26** to join an 'online fleet'. Tag your MP if they're on social media.
- 3. Display the boats in your church or school as a focus for prayer.
- 4. If you are supporting the **YCCN** relay, take your boats along

URC Leaders Condemn International Aid Cut

The **United Reformed Church** along with the **Baptist Union of Great Britain** and the **Methodist Church** have called the UK Government's decision to renege on the UK's international development commitment unfair, unwise and immoral.

The Moderators of General Assembly, the **Revd Clare Downing** and **Mr Peter Pay**, joined their Baptist and Methodist



counterparts in condemning the vote as heartless and self-defeating. They note how other major economies have shown leadership during the pandemic by stepping up their international development programmes, and remark that the UK's decision stands in contrast to its recent announcement of the largest spending on defence since the end of the Cold War.
