Opening Reflection by Vaughan Griffiths

Convenor of the East Midlands Synod Finance Group

I have a scar on my right arm. It runs from my elbow to my wrist in a gentle "S" curve. If you look closely, you can still see the marks of the 49 metal staples that held the cut together while it healed.

If you are already speculating about what accident or trauma caused this injury, let me say straight away that a doctor did it deliberately. About seven years ago I was told I needed heart bypass surgery and to get one of the "tubes" they needed, the doctors removed one of the arteries in my right arm. I didn't know until then that there was more than one in each arm! - but I'm very grateful for the extra one.

In the course of 6 months' rehab, going from being exhausted by a walk to the corner of our road and back, to fitter than I had been for years (and, being an accountant, all recorded on a spreadsheet!) I learned to see the scar as a sign, not of the trauma, or of the surgery, but of a new lease of life.

Since that time, God has led me into areas of service both surprising and unexpected; but also, it seems, fruitful in His Kingdom.


As we come out of lockdown many (all, probably) churches will feel scarred by the experience. Some will not survive as separate congregations. Some will have lost key people. Some will feel it will never be the same again. They are right – it won't!

Individual Christians will be scarred by the isolation of not being able to meet together for so long, by the absence of congregational singing when we have met together, by not having been able to celebrate, or to mourn, together.

But consider this: the cross is a symbol of cruelty and death but adopted by the church as its symbol of new

life in Christ. If you like, God's life-saving surgery for terminally sin-sick humankind.

In 2 Corinthians chapter 4,
Paul talks about the light of
Christ shining in us, and
continues (v.7) "...we have this
treasure in jars of clay..." He
then goes on (v.10): "We
always carry around in our
body the death of Jesus, so
that the life of Jesus may also
be revealed in our body."



How is this possible? By the light of Christ in us; or alternatively, one might say, by the active work of the Holy Spirit within us. To quote verse 7 in full: "But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God, and not from us." Only thus can God's light shine through our cracked jar exterior.

The effects of lockdown and closure will scar us, but through our seeking the renewing power of the Spirit in our lives those scars can become the signs of new life for us who are already part of church, and also for those we seek to introduce to our scarred Lord Jesus Christ.

Pray God it may be so amongst us.


How to Handle Later Life: Free Book Offer

Marion Shoard - URC Elder, contributor to Reform and trustee of ecumenical group Christians on Ageing - is sharing a special offer to all those who would like to receive a copy of her 2017 book How to Handle Later Life — a handbook for older people, exploring the choices we all face as we grow older and how to navigate the potential pitfalls.

Straight-talking and comprehensive, the book deals with everything from housing to finance, social contact to healthcare, transport to the law – as well as the nutritional, exercise and psychological needs of the ageing mind and body – and you can obtain a copy free of charge.

Aimed mainly at older people and their families, the book has also been praised by professionals from nurses to psychologists. **Eric Midwinter**, a founder of the U3A movement, wrote:

"It would be difficult to visualise a more complete and wide-ranging compendium than this on how to cope with the pressures and perils of later age. ... Health, housing, legal matters, finance and all other facets of later life are comprehensively and sympathetically treated, with a user-friendly structure and presentation. United Kingdom.




