News from Botswana

As part of the **Belonging to the World Church** programme, the East Midlands Synod is partnered with the **Botswana Synod of the United Congregational Church of Southern Africa.**



How have our friends in Botswana coped with the Covid-19 pandemic?

In March 2020 when we had just realised the significance of the pandemic that was spreading worldwide, our friends in Botswana were experiencing the same.

As a precautionary measure, the government banned gatherings of more than 50 people and the entry of people from countries deemed high-risk, which obviously affected the churches. On 24 March, the government announced that borders would be closed. Citizens of Botswana were permitted to return but needed to be quarantined for 14 days. There was concern, however, that people were still entering Botswana illegally from Zimbabwe by avoiding official border crossings.

As in the UK, all schools were closed from 20 March.

The UCCSA Botswana Synod made the decision to close all the churches, as we did. Ministers managed to preach from their churches via Facebook to the congregations.

People in Botswana too had to wear face masks: this was compulsory when leaving one's home and social distancing was enforced. Later, they too had zone areas that were locked down.

When the churches were able to reopen, they were limited to 50 people attending: this was very difficult especially in the churches where the congregation is 300-500. Members have had to book in to attend. Fortunately, they are able to hold two services each week, so they can have 100 people attending services in total.

One of the Synod's worries is that they may see a decline in church membership when the restrictions are lifted as many of the elderly have been unable to attend or to use social media.

Botswana too has experienced a second wave which they have found very challenging and from 24 December to 31 January a nationwide curfew was in place nightly from 7.00pm to 4.00am.

Statistics have been issued on a regular basis and they include those that have recovered from the virus, which is very positive. As of 19 April they have had 44,702 confirmed cases: 39,733 have recovered, 684 have died. Botswana has a population of 2,024,787. Its vaccine programme started on 18 March and 100,800 doses have been given, starting with the over-65s.

Maundy Money Honour for Kathleen Pass

Kathleen Pass of Boulevard URC, Nottingham was one of this year's nominees to receive **The Queen's Maundy money**.



The **Royal Maundy Service** has taken place in England since at least the 6th century. In its modern form, it sees the Monarch mark **Maundy Thursday** by presenting symbolic alms to one man and one woman for every year of her (or his) life. As The Queen turned 95 this year, Kathleen was one of just 190 people nationwide nominated for their longstanding Christian service to the church and community.

Owing to the pandemic, the service could not go ahead at Westminster Abbey as planned this year: instead

the Maundy money was delivered by Royal Mail, franked "Buckingham Palace" and accompanied by a letter from The Queen. A white leather purse contains 95 pence in newly minted sterling silver pennies, twopences, threepences and fourpences, while the accompanying red purse contains a £5 coin marking The Queen's 95 years, with the motto "My heart and my devotion", and a commemorative 50 pence piece, this year marking the 50th anniversary of decimalisation.



The Queen is known to take great personal interest in the Maundy Recipients and their exemplary Christian service. Kathleen is a worthy nominee: in addition to her 32 years as a secondary teacher, she has served

65 years as **Treasurer** at Boulevard URC, over 50 years as a **Lay Preacher** throughout Nottinghamshire and South Derbyshire and 9 years as a **Pastoral Consultant** in the East Midlands Synod. She has also long worked as a volunteer at the Bridge Community Centre and served 29 years as a Magistrate on the Nottingham Bench. The East Midlands Synod congratulates Kathleen on this richly deserved honour.

New banners at Abington Avenue URC





Abington Avenue URC in Northampton has unveiled these two magnificent new banners, conceived by **Sue Griffiths** of the church's banner group. Minister the **Revd Jane Wade** describes what they represent:

News from Community of Grace



Community of Grace in Leicester was the first Mission Project recognised within the United Reformed Church. It attempts to create and sustain something like home and family (or household and community) with and for men who have long since lost their own home, or even never really had one.

This extract from its latest newsletter describes the Community's response to Covid-19:

Working through the pandemic

When the pandemic started, one of our Fellows living at **Hunters Lodge** caught Covid-19. This made us realise we needed to create a separate support hub, away from our accommodation.

In March 2020 Community of Grace set up a dedicated hub at **Wycliffe United Reformed Church**. Since then we have been helping over 50 people across the city who are vulnerable, isolating or in poverty. We make sure that we visit every week to deliver healthy, fresh veg, fruit and meat alongside staples like pasta, rice and tinned food. The weekly visits mean we can check in with



people and support them with their housing, benefits or health needs and be a friendly face.



To date, over 200kg of produce grown at **GraceWorks Community Garden**, run by Community of Grace, has been delivered, which has supplemented over 6 tons of food from FareShare and other donations. The service is going to continue through until the summer of 2021 because the team are aware that the financial and emotional effects of the pandemic will continue for some time after restrictions start to ease.

Ben Brown, who leads the work and is a Trustee of Community of Grace alongside **Deborah Baird** and **David Howlett** said,

"It has been a privilege to coordinate this work and it has been amazing to see our community coming together, with support from individuals, faith groups and other charities to get support to everyone who needed it. We have dealt with people who have been sleeping rough in Leicester who are now housed, people who have had no access to money, providing food for people who are shielding and most importantly being there to have a chat with individuals who haven't spoken to another person for weeks. I can't thank everyone enough, whether they have grown food, delivered parcels, befriended someone or donated to our project. Without their love and generosity this would not have been possible."



Community of Grace also wishes to thank the **Leicestershire and Rutland Community Foundation**, which has supported it throughout the pandemic.

Last week Community of Grace received thanks and recognition from Her Majesty the Queen's representative, **Lord-Lieutenant of Leicestershire Mike Kapur** OBE for Community of Grace's strength, resilience and wonderful contribution during the pandemic.

Important Changes to Marriage Registration from 4 May

All "Authorised Persons" who currently undertake the registration of marriages in their churches should take note of the far-reaching changes due to come into force very shortly, on **Tuesday 4 May 2021**, resulting from an Act of Parliament in 2019.

From that date, the existing arrangements to register marriages will be replaced by a new **Marriage Schedule System**. Authorised Persons will no longer issue marriage certificates, maintain a duplicate register, or submit quarterly returns. Instead, a new Marriage Schedule (a single A4 sheet) will be issued in advance by the local Register Office, who will then issue a certificate on its return.

These new marriage schedules will already contain the personal details of the couple (replacing "father" with space for up to four entries per person for "mother/father/parent") and will be used by the Register Office to issue the marriage certificate afterward.



What will remain the same:

- The form of the marriage ceremony, including all religious rites, is unchanged.
- You must still ensure couples **meet the requirements to marry** in your church and that they attend the local Register Office in good time to give notice of their intention to marry.
- You will still be required to obtain the marriage schedule prior to the wedding date (usually the
 register office will first issue it to the couple).
- As an Authorised Person, you will still attend marriages at your registered building.
- You are still required to conduct questioning prior to the ceremony and confirm that the details on the marriage schedule are correct before the marriage proceeds.
- Following the marriage, you will ensure that the marriage schedule is signed by the couple, their witnesses and the officiant.
- You will still **use registration ink** to complete the marriage schedule.

What will change:

- You will no longer register the marriage or issue a certificate. Instead, as Authorised Person you must return the signed marriage schedule within 21 days to the Local Registration Service. It will now be their responsibility to enter the marriage in a new electronic register and subsequently, on payment of a fee, to provide the couple with a marriage certificate.
- You will no longer need to submit quarterly returns or undertake corrections to the register.
- You will no longer maintain a register and duplicate register. The registry office will in due course issue instructions for the closure of registers and the return of hard copy registers and certificate stock (although churches will normally retain the duplicate register for their records).

HM Passport Office has issued detailed instructions and training materials to support these changes, which Authorised Persons may access online via the **Local Registration Service Association** (LRSA) website www.lrsa.org.uk. (If you are in a URC Church, please disregard the separate guidelines for Clergy; slightly different provision is made for the Church of England.) You should have been issued with a password for this purpose; if not, your local registry office should be able to help.

National (England) Youth Sector Census



The **National Youth Agency** (NYA) is undertaking a Census of Youth Sector Activities to help inform the upcoming Comprehensive Spending Review and help shape strategies for workforce development, training and support. Over 16,000 organisations that deliver youth services or related activities in England have already been identified through being registered with the Charity Commission, but there are still many thousands of others who provide services and activities to young people. The NYA are conscious that a large proportion of those will come from within the Christian faith community – **that's us!**

The NYA intend to use the survey data for planning future development strategies, co-ordinating funding and communications, and enabling young people to find out what's available, and more. We and they are concerned that all parts of the sector are able to have a voice, including those operating through the church and Christian faith agencies, so please do take part to show the huge contribution that Christian youth work is making to the wider youth work sector.

The UK CYWC has been in touch with the NYA in order to raise the profile of Christian youth work and ministry through the census and are keen to encourage every aspect of our vital work to be recorded and recognised through this survey.



Rewilding the Church: Virtual Book Group


Wednesday evenings at 7.30pm until 26 May


