Then of course, we had November 5th, celebrated with fireworks and bonfires, where in the celebrations at Lewes effigies of Theresa May and Boris Johnson had replaced the traditional Guy Fawkes. Also, in the procession every year 13 Crosses are carried and laid at the War Memorial, remembering 13 Protestant martyrs who were burnt at the stake in Lewes High Street during the brief reign of Mary 1.

#### IS YOUR CHURCH LISTED AND/OR IN A CONSERVATION AREA?

The other day I read about the National Trust's conservation and remedial work on Lindisfarne Castle a Grade 1listed building. A lot of the remedial work was due to damp. The article noted that "early restoration efforts had trapped it in the walls, causing it to spread ... all the old cement based materials (were) replaced with a traditional lime plaster helping the building to breath." This reminded me of an early 18 C Grade 2 –listed church building in the West Midlands Synod, the walls of which had been given a cement render, trapping naturally rising damp into the walls, and causing the internal plaster to 'blow' and the external brickwork to deteriorate.

As you may know, many buildings, like Lindisfarne Castle and Bedworth URC, are listed because their structure and appearance is deemed to be a significant part of the historical built environment of our towns, villages and countryside and are worth preserving. Some of the church buildings in our Synod are part of this historical and architectural significance within the town or village in which they are situated, and are listed, mostly Grade 2, but some Grade.2\*.

In 1990, and subsequently in 2010, the United Reformed Church was specifically included in the "Ecclesiastical Exemption Acts" of Parliament. This means that by those Acts, instead of the Church Secretary, or other person duly authorised by the Church Meeting, making an application for planning permission to make repairs or changes to a listed Church building to the Local Authority (LA), the application should now be made to your Synod, in this case the East Midland Synod of the URC which has been given the power to decide the application instead of the LA.

So firstly:- if your church is Listed and/or in a Conservation Area and wishes to make repairs or changes to, for instance a roof, walls or windows, or make changes to the inside of the building, then the first port of call is to the Robert White at the Synod office. Do NOT apply to the L.A. first as they may not be aware that the Acts apply to URC buildings.

And secondly: - your church will probably be referred to the Synod's Listed Buildings Advisory Committee (LBAC). As part of the membership of the committee we have expert Conservation Architects and others who can give advice about what can and can't be done to church buildings which are listed; and also advice about remedial work to buildings, like crack's in wall's and plasterwork.

Thirdly – if your church is contemplating repairs, renovations or changes to your buildings make sure your Architect, who you may have consulted, is also aware of the Synod's LBAC, as many are not aware of the inclusion of URC churches in the Ecclesiastical Exemption Acts.

And so finally, if your building is listed or in a conservation area the LBAC is here to give advice and help. So please ask!

#### THEOLOGY SLAM

A search for new engaging voices thinking theologically about the contemporary world.

The Archbishop of Canterbury has endorsed an exciting competition to find engaging young voices who think theologically about the contemporary world.

"Theology Slam" is organised jointly by the Church Times, SCM Press, the Community of St Anselm, and the London Institute for Contemporary Christianity (LICC).

It is open to anyone, lay or ordained, between the ages of 18 to 30, and consists of two rounds.

In the first round, applicants are asked to write 500 words on one of 12 contemporary issues, which include Theology and Mental Health; Theology and Artificial Intelligence; and Theology and Political Tribalism. Alongside the 500 words, applicants are also asked to submit a 90-second video, introducing who they are and why they are interested in the topic. The deadline for submissions is 11.59 p.m. on 7 December.

Three entrants will be chosen to take part in the Theology Slam Final on 7 March 2019 at LICC in central London, where they will deliver talks of between seven and ten minutes, based on the 500-word entry. Each finalist will have been given a half-day training session on public speaking before the final, free of charge.

The three talks will be judged on the night by a panel that consists of Dr Eve Poole, the Third Church Estates Commissioner and theologian; Professor John Swinton, the winner of the 2016 Michael Ramsey Prize; Mark Greene, the executive director of LICC; and the Revd Dr Isabelle Hamley, Chaplain to the Archbishop of Canterbury. There will also be an audience Q&A. The talks will be filmed and made available on YouTube and social media.

The winner will receive a collection of books worth up to £200 and his or her 500-word entry will be published in the Church Times.
