Growing up I have always felt like a novelty within the church, a young person who has always favoured traditional hymns to modern ones. For me my early memories of Church and worship are singing hymns such as *How Great Thou Art* and *Great is Thy Faithfulness* in my local URC. Throughout my childhood I then went onto worship in C of E, Salvation Army and Catholic services, all giving me a different view of worship.

Recently my family and I have started to attend a new church that has a very modern worship style, this was challenging for me as I felt that I could not worship properly. To me, the music did not have the same impact and did not allow me to worship in the way more traditional hymns could. Personally this has highlighted the role that music has played in my faith. Going to a church that isn't as traditional as I'm used to has helped me to explore my relationship with worship further.

At the national youth executive meetings we do a variety of styles of worship (led by Jenny Mills) which has then broadened my experience of worship- a lot of which I have really enjoyed! Upon reflection and discussion with other young people my age I have discovered that we all worship differently and that for some, like me, music forms a large part of their worship but for others not so much.

Having recently started the 4th and final year of my degree I have begun to explore different types of worship, at my university Christian Union and at services at Coventry's famous cathedral. I have come to accept that my style of worship is an ecumenical blend of lots of different styles which has helped me to appreciate the diversity of the Christian faith.

Personally, I have grown in my faith through experiencing new ways of worship and I would encourage you all the explore different ways as well. This could be done through inviting different members (both old and young!) of the congregation to pick the worship music or style for church that Sunday. By doing this you might discover and enjoy new ways of worshiping that you hadn't tried before!
