

THE END IS IN SIGHT

The end of Lent, that is. If this e-letter could confidently predict the end of the coronavirus crisis... well, I suspect it would gain a few more subscribers for a start.

When it comes to Lent, there are two schools of thought: do you give something up? Or rather, take something up? For me, 2020 has been the start of a new adventure in discipleship. So I've plumped for "taking up", namely a conscious act of devotion every day. It's something I've tried many times before but somewhere in the second week or so I tend to realise 24 hours have gone by with very little conscious anything.

My daughter and son, though, have stuck doggedly to the "giving up" approach: the time-honoured challenge of shunning sweets and chocolate, the better to enjoy one's Easter eggs.

Yes, that old chestnut. I can't be too smug about it because they're doing far better than ever I managed in my teens. There was the one year I survived forty days and forty nights without recourse to a Wispa bar but somehow it doesn't seem so impressive three decades on.

Still, I know who is enjoying this year's Lenten journey more: the one monopolising the confectionery. Where they have eschewed, I have chewed.

The point is, we approach the end of Lent in a place few of us could have anticipated back in the good old days of Ash Wednesday – two days before the first documented transmission of Covid-19 within UK borders. Aptly, it was my son who best captured the conundrum: "I thought I was giving up chocolate for Lent," he said: "I didn't think I was giving up church!"

The pillars of our habitual existence have fallen away with dizzying rapidity. We are captives, many of us, within our own four walls. For the foreseeable future, we are denied the joy of joining our voices together in worship in the house of God.

Carried off in a different sort of captivity, the Psalmist laments: "How shall we sing the Lord's song in a strange land?" For us likewise, this is uncharted territory.

But we haven't given up church for Lent, not at all. We have taken it up in a dazzling variety of forms, old and new. Bible readings and candlelit vigils. Podcasts and YouTube videos. Social media and web pages. Telephone conferences and video chatrooms. We are all discovering new ways of being church: on the phone, on the internet, or with arms reaching out to our neighbours in need. Singing the Lord's song to a hundred strange new tunes. It has made my own Lenten goal an easy one. No danger at present of ignoring the fundamental matters of life and death: rarely have I turned to God so constantly, or sought intercessions with such urgency. Meanwhile my meagre

devotions are elevated by a magnificent outpouring of prayer and reflection, freely offered on every side.

Do not misunderstand me: these are silver linings to a very dark cloud. This year we arrive at the foot of the cross all too aware of the sin and suffering of our world. The burden we lay upon our Lord is a heavy one.

Yet ours is a God who cannot be held captive, not even by death: who forever rolls away the stone and springs up to new life.

Our Easter gatherings are cancelled. Easter is not. If we are truly a Resurrection people, we rejoice with all our hearts in the risen Christ of Easter Sunday and carry the flame of his hope toward a liberation yet to come. This may be an Easter like none we have known. Even so, I pray it may bring you renewed faith and deepest joy. *Derek Graham* (TDO)

THE FRONT LINE OF NHS CHAPLAINCY

I had the pleasure of chatting with Revd Dr Kay Cattell last week and finding out what life is like on the front line of NHS Chaplaincy.

Kay has served the United Reformed Church since Ordination in 2005 and Joined NUH in March 2017, being appointed Deputy Head of Service for Spiritual and Pastoral Care in June 2019, following her service at Sherwood Forest Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust between June 2013 to March 2017.

She explained that the task of looking after the spiritual wellbeing of the staff remains a high priority. She agreed that this is a "challenging and difficult time for patients, relatives and staff", but she is coping by relying on God, her experience and having a sense of humour. I spoke after she had finished a long shift and Kay had just got home to her family.

Kay is not alone in this task and is joined by another United Reformed Church Minister from the Synod who is appointed from the *bank*, Revd Sally Martin serves the churches of Ermine, St Columba's & Trinity in Lincoln and offers herself for this vital task of hospital chaplaincy having a wealth of experienced gained during her time in Medical Chaplaincy between 1998 – 2013.

We are grateful to our colleagues for their dedication to this task and want to assure them of our prayers as they look after staff and patients alike. As we are unable to visit our own folk in hospital at this time, please make use of the Spiritual and Pastoral Care teams at your local hospitals and if that involves the Nottingham University hospitals Kay would be happy to help. Hold both Kay and Sally in your prayers asking our Lord to bless them with protection, courage and faith.
