Opening Reflection by Charles Jolly

Green Apostle



Jesus' parable of the separation of the caring sheep from the uncaring goats, or Ezekiel's prophecy of the dismal fate for the fat prosperous sheep who had neglected the thin hungry ones, remind us of how much our actions matter. Not, of course, to earn 'Brownie points' for Heaven but to help welcome God's Kingdom now. The more we respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit and try to care practically for needy people and for God's suffering Earth, the more our hearts and even emotions will follow suit.

I picture ancient Palestine with lepers, desolate widows, disabled or blind beggars, dodgy tax-collectors, convicts and day labourers hoping against hope for work. These were the individuals for whom Jesus had time and who will be 'compelled' to enter the Kingdom. If you had hard-heartedly ignored their needs and God's justice all your life, then you would not find God's Kingdom on Earth nor in Heaven, nor Jesus Himself particularly attractive.

But here is the problem. There are still far too many people in the UK urgently needing support and justice (and indeed churches have done sterling work distributing food and comfort during the pandemic) but we seldom see those in greatest distress on our streets today. We seldom meet with the exploited and trafficked; it is even easier to forget the millions in far countries suffering from climate chaos and environmental degradation or slaving to produce cheap food, clothes and electronics for us. How do we respond to their individual need for justice and avoid becoming by default hard-hearted fat sheep?

That is not a rhetorical question, because we are 'hard-wired' to interact as individuals or smallish groups and so caring for individuals has always been the strength of the Church (although even Jesus had to preach to large crowds or to weep over the whole of Jerusalem). In JPIC (the Synod's working group for Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation), we remember that transforming unjust structures of society, pursuing peace and reconciliation and sustaining and renewing the life of the earth are crucial aspects of Christian mission. These are not abstract concepts. The purpose is to help down-trodden individuals, support exploited communities, enable the destitute to work their way out of poverty and to care for all species. Commitment for Life and TEARFUND help us focus our prayers down to countries, regions, communities and individuals.

This is why we are seeking to build a network of **Advocates** and **Green Apostles** across the Synod and **Graham Ghaleb**, **Tom Veitch** or I would be delighted to hear from anyone interested.

Emerging from the second lockdown

Our Synod Property Officer Geoff Milnes shares the following guidance:

Now that the national lockdown is coming to an end, it is likely that a number of churches will be wondering whether or not they can re-open. The statement by the Prime Minister on Monday 23 November indicated that Churches in all Tiers will be able to open for worship, but that there will be some constraints depending on which Tier the location falls into when these are announced on Thursday.

The ruling is that those attending worship will have to maintain social distancing and wear masks throughout, there will be no singing, and no mixing of bubbles i.e. no coffee after the service!

Having said that, there is no compulsion on Churches to re-open, and if it is felt safer to stay closed that is quite in order. The health and safety of our members and congregations has to take top priority.

Please keep up to date with the information given out by the Government by regularly accessing <u>their</u> <u>website</u>. This will give details of the do's and don'ts, and much more detailed information, particularly regarding the Tiers that exist, and any changes to them.

If you do decide to open for your usual Sunday worship, **please let me know** so that we can keep people informed. I do not need to see Risk Assessments as these are the responsibility of the Elders but do keep a lookout for information from your insurers about the level of cover they are providing in the current circumstances.



Protect the UK's aid budget: please contact your MP

On 20 November, members of the URC's **Mission Council** unanimously passed an emergency resolution objecting to reports that the government is preparing to cut the international aid budget.

It affirmed that Mission Council "believes that a commitment to the poorest in the world should not be an optional extra but at the heart of our country's responsibilities, especially in the context of a global pandemic and a climate emergency."



The Moderators of the General Assembly, the Revd Clare Downing and Mr Peter Pay, have already written to the Chancellor of the Exchequer. In their letter, they express their "strong concern" that the government may "break its manifesto pledge and abandon Britain's long-standing commitment to spending 0.7% of national income on international development."

More from Mission Council



Mission Council, the URC's executive body, was convened online last Friday and Saturday, 20-21 November. Other highlights of the meeting included the inductions of **Karen Campbell** as Secretary of Global and Intercultural Ministries and the **Revd Jenny Mills**, former East Midlands Synod minister, as Secretary for Education and Learning.

Towards being an anti-racist Church

Mission Committee unanimously passed a resolution committing the URC to journey towards becoming an anti-racist Church. It noted the difference between being non-racist (which is passive and accepts the status quo) and being anti-racist (which actively challenges racism).

Single use plastics

Mission Council noted with alarm the huge increase in the use of disposable items during the Covid-19 pandemic, especially single-use plastics. It urged churches to keep their use to an absolute minimum and to dispose of them responsibly.

What's the problem?

There has been a huge increase in the use of disposable items during the Covid-19 pandemic, especially single-use plastics, which is having a major environmental impact.

Plastic is a significant contributor to climate change, as it generates greenhouse gas emissions at every stage of its lifecycle.

Plastic waste has an enormously detrimental effect on our rivers, oceans and wildlife. It can choke or smother fish, dolphins, seabirds and seals. No square mile of surface ocean anywhere on earth is free of plastic pollution. It takes hundreds of years to break down, and the effects of microplastics on ecosystems are only just beginning to be understood.

"Covid will eventually go away, plastic waste won't, it's here forever." Dr Christian Dunn, Bangor University

Isn't plastic essential to protect us from the virus?

Items made of single-use plastic have undoubtably been important in the fight against Covid-19, especially for protective equipment for frontline health and care workers.

However, in non-clinical settings, there is no evidence that disposable plastic versions of products such as gloves, facemasks or food and drink packaging give any greater protection against coronavirus than reusable equivalents.

What can we do?

There are a wide range of alternatives to using disposable single-use plastic items – see opposite. To protect health and reduce the risk of transmission of the virus, good hygiene practices and risk management measures also continue to be vital.

"As a body of people committed to caring for God's creation, our intent is to reduce our carbon footprint, improve recycling, minimise waste and improve efficiencies on finite natural resources in all of our operations." URC Environmental Policy

Facemasks: The government recommends reusable face coverings to the general public. Research by consumer group Which? found that well-fitting twoor three-layer fabric masks are just as effective at filtering out bacterial particles as single-use surgical masks. It<u>recommends</u> NEQI Reusable Face Masks, £15 for three, available from Boots and Ocado, and Bags of Ethics Great British Designers Face Coverings, £15 for three, available at John Lewis, Boots, Sainsbury's, Argos and Waitrose.

If half of the UK's population used one disposable mask a day for a year, it would create more than 30.000 tonnes of contaminated plastic waste. UCL

Gloves: According to Which? disposable surgical gloves are not generally needed for the general public: "Gloves are just as likely to become contaminated when out and about, so instead of throwing away a pair of gloves each time you go out, washing your hands or using sanitiser are better options. Wearing gloves may also give the false impression of hand hygiene, while forgetting to change your gloves would be just as bad as forgetting to wash your hands."

Reusable cups, food containers, & shopping bags: In June 2020, <u>a study by health experts</u> concluded that during the pandemic "reusable systems can be used safely by employing basic hygiene".

Disposable cups and plates: There are various alternatives to plastic cups and tableware, such as compostable plant-based Vegware(vegware.com) and 'I'm a Green Cup' Bio Cups from simplyecopackaging.co.uk and other suppliers.

Cleaning: <u>Current government advice</u> is that there is no need to use additional personal protective equipment, special antibacterial wipes or other disposable products when cleaning in nonhealthcare settings during the pandemic. The recommendation is to clean and launder more often,

using standard products. Eco-friendly cleaning products in refillable containers are becoming available in many places.

Statement from Congregational Insurance



Following the statement from Ansvar in our previous edition, Congregation Insurance have issued an updated <u>unoccupancy statement</u>. Dated 1 December 2020, this replaces all previous versions. It begins:

Whilst many churches re-opened following government advice and local authority lockdown guidance; the recent introduction of national restrictions and lockdowns have resulted in churches having to close again. In light of this change we are issuing a revised statement to churches, restating the following:

For a period up to and including 31 January 2021, we confirm that if the church decides to remain closed solely due to concerns about coronavirus (Covid-19) we will a) waive the condition to advise us of that closure and b) waive the restrictions in the policy relating to premises which are empty, disused, or not in use.

The CWF sends apologies to all of those people who had planned to attend this event. They hope to be able to meet again in 2022.

Christian Aid

Inspired by Jesus, **Christian Aid** supporters walk alongside those for whom coronavirus is yet another threat on top of existing ones, including the climate crisis, conflict and in 2020 the impact of locust swarms.



Their gifts and actions help people like **Mekonnen Sofar** in Ethiopia's South Omo region, who digs a metre deep in dry river beds to try to find a water source to keep his livestock alive as the climate crisis pushes his family into hunger and threatens his whole way of life.

Christian Aid is working with families like Mekonnen's to provide community water sources and explore alternative means of raising income such as through making soap from aloe vera and planting drought resistant crops.

This Christmas churches are being invited to join **in a moment of solidarity and hope on Advent Sunday, 29 November** by using the carol '*When out of poverty is born*' in their worship and taking a collection for Christian Aid.

The hymn, which is freely available to use to use from <u>caid.org.uk/christmasresources</u>, celebrates Mary's faith in the Magnificat and begins with the words '*When out of poverty is born a dream that will not die*'. This Christmas we can celebrate the incredible truth that we are bound together globally by a love that builds resilience in the face of disease, drought and darkness, that builds up hope for all our neighbours.

Hope Nottingham



Food bank charity **Hope Nottingham** is supporting two specific Christmas campaigns. For the **Nottingham City Churches Christmas Boxes** they seek donations of chocolate, sweets, crisps, biscuits, fairy lights and card games. For **The Mayor of Broxtowe's Christmas Hampers**, they ask for food treats including Christmas snacks and confectionery.

Donations for these campaigns are requested by 4 December. Drop-

off points for donations include local supermarkets as well as Hope House, Boundary Road, Beeston, Nottingham NG9 2RF (Mon-Fri 9.30am-4.00pm).

They also continue to distribute standard food parcels and ask that donations from 5 December should concentrate on essential food and toiletry items rather than Christmas treats, as these goods will most likely be distributed in January. They have good stocks of pasta, pasta sauce, soup and baked beans but request tea/coffee, sugar, biscuits, tinned meat and fish, tinned fruit and veg, long-life milk, jam, tinned custard and puddings etc.
